The Community Access Committee would like to remind our residents of a few things for the holiday, and the start of our 2022 Season.

Please remember that during the holidays, "crimes of opportunity" occur more frequently. Please secure your items in your golf carts and vehicles. Keep items out of plain view, including wallets, purses and cell phones. Items left in carts should be physically secured or removed when not in use. Also, please REMOVE your golf cart key when parked!

As we move towards our busy season, we will have more pedestrians on the roadways within the community. Monitoring speed and adhering to posted stop signs will help ensure that we have a fun and safe season.

Bicyclists and golf carts should be traveling in the same direction as vehicle traffic, and also are required to obey posted signage.

Children under the age of 14 years should not be driving golf carts within the community. Individuals who are of age to drive the golf cart on the roadway should understand the posted signage, and also be able to signal their intentions to turn, if the golf cart is not equipped with turn signals.

During Season, the associations are inundated with calls regarding parking issues. Please be mindful of your association's rules and regulations involving parking. If you are renting your unit, please advise your guests.

The Access Control Gate also receives a high volume of noise complaints during season. It is important to remember that Lee County restricts the noise levels between the hours of 10 p.m. to 7 a.m.

We would like to thank all of you for continued support to make our community a safe place to be during the holidays and our busy season.

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

competition of bocce to more people. Not even hot temperatures can

keep our hardy players from enjoying the game! With the most games played, Lou Paolillo and Tom Darrell are tied for first place. The women leaders are Marge Currao and Leanne King.

First brought to the United States by Italian immigrants, bocce is one of the oldest games in the world, with some claiming evidence of its origins in Egyptian cave paintings. The ancient game is still popular today, and can be found everywhere from the beach to brunch at many restaurants.

Are you a bocce beginner? Learn how to play the classic game with the help of these tips.

Bocce is played competitively around the world, but it's also easy for anyone to pick up and play for fun. Before you begin to play, it's important to understand the basics. Let us start with equipment.

Bocce features limited equipment, and BSMCC provides this. All you need to play is a bocce set, which consists of two different types of balls:

Bocce Balls – A bocce set consists of eight larger balls known as "bocce balls." They may come in different sizes depending on skill level and age, but a regulation-size ball has a diameter of about 4.2 inches. The balls come four to a set, in two different colors, to easily represent each team. They will often be red or green, but other colors may be available as well.

Pallino – The pallino, which is sometimes referred to as a "jack," is a smaller ball that is used to represent the target for the bocce balls during game play.

Have your interest? More to follow next month.

If you are new to bocce and wonder what all the excitement is about - join us on Tuesday afternoons at 3 p.m. No training or special equipment needed. Bring yourself, a lawn chair and eagerness to play. Great friends, good conversation and lots of smiles.

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Fit Happens... Restorative and Natural Healing

Restorative healing or health from the inside out, has become a trending topic across the country, and the benefits of meditation, hypnotherapy and nutrition, in particular, focuses on alleviating stress, calming the mind, relaxing and improving the workings of the body.

Gurus everywhere are preaching and teaching that many health concerns can be addressed proactively, by first alleviating stress, second by connecting the mind and body, and third through meditation and nutrition, getting to a place of balance from the inside out.

However, if you are one of many people who believe they cannot meditate, or if eating right is difficult for you, or perhaps you believe mental health support is "not for you," then you need to forget everything you thought you knew about these topics.

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Gardener's Wheelbarrow

At last! Everyone can move outside and enjoy their garden. Cooler days and nights have finally arrived. Now is the time to get out and appraise your landscaping, decide what needs to go, and plan for new additions. The month of December will generally be dry, with only two inches of rain - if we're lucky. Last December we had less than three inches of rain, and daytime temps were cooler, with highs ranging from 59 to 82, and lows from 42 to 67. This is a month when frost **can also** occur. Be prepared for anything and watch for plants drying out

if there is heat combined with wind. Keep soil moist, but don't water if frost is expected.

Blooming trees this month include fall orchid trees, kapok trees and white shaving brush trees. Most flowering tropical plants will continue to bloom, unless challenged by frosty temperatures.

This month's garden checklist: keep plants and turf adequately hydrated and guard tender tropicals (including orchids) from low temperatures.

• Tropical plants – this is not their favorite season. No need to call in the paramedics if you see some yellowing and loss of foliage due to cooler temperatures. When it turns chilly and

there's rain, brown spot can appear on the leaves of ixora and croton.

- Frost predicted? Cover your plants (no plastic!), and remember to remove the covering by 10 a.m. so daytime temperatures don't cook your plants. And, to be on the safe side, orchids should be brought in or protected if temperatures are predicted to drop below 50 degrees.
- Potted poinsettias need to be watered, but should not be allowed to get too wet. They do best with at least 14 hours of natural or artificial light per day.
- Christmas cacti and kalanchoes are best watered every two to three weeks. Once they bloom, they require lots of light, but very little water and no fertilizer.
- \bullet Cages, pools, proximity to a wall, a rotating ceiling fan... all will moderate temperatures. The coldest temperature will occur around 6-6:30 a.m. It only takes a few minutes of cold, not freezing temperatures, to substantially harm or kill tropical plants.
- Pruning forget it, especially if it's a frost-sensitive plant. Pruning encourages tender new growth. You can safely prune again in March.
- Annuals remove dead flowers to encourage continued flowering.
- Now is the time to move crowded plants to a better location. Be sure to get a good-sized root ball. Keep the soil moist!
- At this time of year, established plants have definitely slowed down their growth rate and consequently require less of everything...water, fertilizer and pruning. Water less frequently, but deeply, to encourage deep healthy roots.


- • Islamorada Entrance Gate to Cape Cole Blvd. $-\,0.82$ mile

- \bullet Cape Cole Blvd., golf club gate arm to Matecumbe Key entry -0.72 mile
- Matecumbe Key Blvd., construction entrance to Cape Cole Blvd., 0.72 mile

- \bullet Matecumbe Key Blvd., Cape Cole Blvd., to South Shore 0.55 mile
- \bullet Courtside Landings' Loop, start/stop at entrance -0.48 mile
- Prosperity Point sidewalk loop, start/stop at Matcumbe Key Blvd, 1.26 mile
- Admiral's Point loop (includes Key Largo Lane Circle, Sable Key Circle and Key Largo Circle) start/stop at Marathon & Cape Cole Blvd., 1.06 mile
- Tarpon Pass loop, start/stop at Islamorada Blvd., 0.76 mile

Five years ago, there were about 500,000 active players (known as "picklers") playing a game that is a mishmash of tennis, badminton and ping-pong. Holiday Golf Cart Decorating Tips

- Stay away from strong tapes like strapping tape and clear duct tape. Use zip ties or scotch tape when attaching items to your cart.
- If you use tape to attach your decorations, it should be removed within 24 hours.

September's tips were:

- Use a spare battery to run lights. This way, you are not running your cart's battery down.
- If you are not using battery-operated lights, buy an inverter, and use it to run your lights. Walmart carries them. Check to see if your cart is 36 or 48 volts. They are inexpensive and last a long time.

October's tips were:

- Go online and Google "how to decorate golf carts for Christmas," or "golf carts decorated for Christmas," to get ideas.
- Use multi-color "under body glow lights." You can purchase them online.
- Use Command Strips, they will stick to metal and glass and can be removed easily.

November tips were:

- Use Poinsettia plants to decorate your cart. Then you can enjoy them around your house.
- Use rubbing alcohol to remove any tape residue, it will not damage the paint on your cart.
- You can use a single fitted sheet to cover the roof of your golf cart to make it look like snow, add lights under the sheet to enhance it.
- The most important TIP is to HAVE FUN, meet new people, and enjoy the evening.

Decembers tips are:


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2021 Veterans Day Events at BSM "Salute to our Military...Past and Present"

1940 acronym, counterintelligence, dunk shot, magic



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Plant of the Month...Christmas Cactus

Some good friend or relative gave you a beautiful, colorful potted plant to enjoy this season...wow...look at all those flowers! It's probably a Christmas cactus, but it may be one of two similar plants:

Thanksgiving cacti (Schlumbergera truncata) bloom from late fall to mid-winter and are often mislabeled as Christmas cacti. They were once commonly called the "crab claw cactus" or "crab cactus." You can identify it by the pointy "teeth" on the sides of each stem segment. These teeth are soft, not sharp, and can vary in size, but are almost always visible on the plant to some degree.

Christmas cacti (S. x buckleyi) bloom from early winter to mid-winter. Its stem segments lack pointed teeth, with more scalloped or rounded edges.

Unlike other cacti, the Christmas cactus (schlumbergera x buckleyi) and its relatives don't live in hot, arid environments such as deserts or plains. In fact, these succulents are native to the tropical rainforests of southern Brazil, where they grow on tree branches and soak up the high humidity, filtered sunlight, and warm temperatures. So, don't treat a Christmas cactus like it's a run-of-themill cactus or succulent. They can't take the same sort of sunny, dry conditions that other cacti can.

A daytime temperature of 70°F and an evening temperature of 60 - 65°F is preferred. This plant is perfect to keep inside, rather than outside your home in Florida summers. Christmas cacti prefer a more humid environment, which makes a bright bathroom or kitchen a good spot to keep them. Plants should be kept in bright, indirect light. An east-facing window or a bright bathroom is ideal. Too much direct sunlight can bleach the sensitive leaves.



Plan to water every 2 - 3 weeks, but only water when the top one third of soil feels dry to the touch. When the soil is dry, soak the soil until water runs through the pot's drainage holes. Place a tray underneath the pot to catch the water. After 10 - 15 minutes, discard any excess water in the tray so that the pot doesn't sit in water. It's especially important to water well while the plant is flowering.

Prune plants in late spring to encourage branching and more flowers. Cut off a few sections of each stem; the plant will branch from the wound. And, you can place the cut pieces in a lightly moist potting soil - they root easily after a few weeks and make for excellent Christmas presents!

If your cactus is not blooming, it may be receiving too much light or too-high temperatures. To get Christmas cactus to bloom in the years after purchase, it comes down to two things: light and temperature. Christmas cacti produce flowers in a cool, environment with a short day-cycle. To begin the production of flower buds, there needs to be at least eight days of 16 hours of dark, and eight hours of light each day. Wherever the plant is placed, do not turn on the lights at night, even for a short period of time. That breaks the dark cycle required. Also, avoid placing the plant where it receives either cold or hot air drafts.

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Tight Lines...Fishing for Sharks

If you like to fish for sharks, build your own terminal tackle for inshore harbor shark fishing. While fishing in warm tropical waters you will, at some point, tangle with one of the many species of Florida sharks. Having the correct tackle for



these great fighters is a must. Fishing for sharks, for at least the last 50 years, from the Gulf of Maine to the waters off Mexico, I have come to understand that large sharks can inhabit very shallow waters, and small sharks can be caught in waters as deep as a 1000 ft. Here in Florida, many species of sharks spend at least some time in the waters of Charlotte Harbor. A good friend of mine invited me on a shark fishing trip, and to my amazement, just 3 miles from the entrance to our marina we settled in for a day of shark fishing.

Having fished for many years in the waters off Montauk, Long Island, New York a shark fishing trip usually meant a trip out 30 or 40 miles into the Atlantic in water to well over 150 ft. deep. In many trips, 400 to 500 ft. of water was the norm. So, you could imagine my shock when we started fishing in the harbor for shark in just 14 ft. of water.

I brought my usual shark rig along on that trip that was a 6 ft. heavy graphite fishing rod, a Penn International 50 reel loaded with 80 lb. monofilament fishing line, a fighting vest

Rules of the Road

Motor Vehicles: Always drive your vehicle on the right side of the road. There are no "turn lanes" within Burnt Store Marina. Never drive your vehicle in lanes indicated for the use of bicycles and pedestrians. Always stop at stop signs. Never exceed the posted speed limit.

Pedestrians: Always use lanes provided for bicycles and pedestrians. If there is no lane available, use the left side of the street, facing wheeled traffic. Use caution when crossing streets. Wear reflective clothing and carry a flashlight when walking or running after sunset.

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
Kathryn and Peter Lovering Vincent Ave. Punta Gorda, FL Licensed & Insured PT09-0862 / FC09-0860 that attached to my reel, and 10 shark rigs made up of 12 ft. of hard wire line rated at 500 lbs., as well as a 16/0 "J" hook. My friend looked at me as if I just landed at Charlotte Harbor from some far-off planet. Thus, my lessons began about the wonderful Charlotte Harbor Shark Fishery.

There are at least 6 species of sharks that frequent the harbor. Some are bottom feeders, while many more inhabit the middle water column. In 14 ft. of water, that translates to about a habitat of feeding 7 to 8 ft. down. While on this first harbor shark trip I was prepared for that 500 to 600 lb. shark. Make no mistake, these big boys are, in fact, in the harbor. The more common shark is between 40 lbs. and 300 lbs. The rule breaker was the world record Hammerhead of 1268 lbs., which was caught in the pass several years ago. She was feeding on the big run of spring tarpon. It is not uncommon to see during the Tarpon Run, which occurs in Boca Grande Pass close to the mouth of the Gulf 500 and 600 lb. bull and hammerhead sharks attacking the tarpon. These big guys frequent the offshore waters of the Gulf, chasing the schools of tarpon on their migration. Rarely will you see one of these huge sharks in the shallows of the harbor. However, as a foot note, many anglers will see big, big sharks in water 3 to 5 ft. deep, from time to time, as they follow the big schools of redfish.

After that first trip to fish the shallow waters of the harbor for shark, I abandoned my offshore fishing rod and reel as well as my giant hooks. As I paid a visit to a number of local tackle shops to buy some locally designed shark rigs, I saw two things. First, the hooks and leader were very expensive. They cost from \$3.50 to \$12 each. Second, it was almost impossible to find a shark rig with a circle hook attached. Almost all prerigged hooks were the old "J" hooks. Since I like to release all my sharks, it is more difficult to release a shark that may have deep swallowed a "J" hook, as compared to a lip hooked shark, who took a bait on a circle hook. As a result, I decided to build my own version of a shallow water Charlotte Harbor shark rig. Since you cut off your shark hook from the shark's mouth, if you can't make an easy dehook without losing a finger or getting a bad shark bite, it can get to be expensive. You might want to try making your own shark hook rigs.

Here is what I tried, and the materials I used. I decide to build two different designs for my shark hook rigs. One design was for fishing well into the harbor for the smaller sharks that inhabit that water, and a much different shark hook rig for fishing the sharks closer to the Pass (not in the Pass). For the shallow water sharks, I used a Marlin Brand Hard Wire Stainless Steel wire leader of 150 lb. test. I cut the wire into 6 ft. lengths. At the hook end of the shark rig, I selected a 10/0, non-stainless circle hook, manufactured by Mustad. I attached the hook directly to the line by wrapping the wire line in a twist about 10 times. This non-sliding method held the hook well. I made sure there was no wire end sticking out away from the hook. I clipped the metal tag







Barrel Swivel using the same twisting method I used to attach the hook to the wire leader. It was that simple to make my inshore shark hook rig. My cost was approximately 50 cents each.

If in a moment of craziness, I decided on one trip to fish for tiger sharks closer to the pass, I designed a much heavier hook rig. First, I selected a heavy-duty Mustad Circle hook measured at a 10/0 with a silver finished hook. This is a rather small hook for this heavy-duty rig, but I felt I could always catch a big shark on a smaller hook, but not a real small shark on too large a hook. I purchased a package of 7-strand coffee-colored wire leader material. This wire material had a breaking strength of 600 lb. test. Instead of attaching the hook to this seven-strand wire leader material with the use of the twist method which I used for the much lighter rig, I purchased dark-colored lock-sleeves made by Momoi, which required you to use a crimping pliers to attach the hook to the wire line. I cut a 14-inch length of wire line which would serve as the "BITE AREA" just after the attached hook. I attached a 500 lb. Bill Fisher stainless steel swivel to that end of the wire line, which will eventually serve to connect a 300 lb. 6 ft. piece of standard monofilament line. I ran the monofilament line through the sleeve, and proceeded to crimp the line in a circle, from which I could attach the line running off my reel to this shark rig. Attached you will find two photos that show you my finished product. By the way, I estimated the cost for this heavier shark hook rig at \$1.25 each. What seems difficult to make, gets easier after making the first try rig.

On a subsequent shark fishing trip, using my home-made shark fishing rigs, I caught a nice 175 lb. hammerhead shark on the lighter shark hook rig, and an estimated 300 lb. bull shark caught just inside the pass. After that trip, I made a bunch of the lighter version shark rigs and decided that my trips to fish for the big guys in the pass is over. A little too much for an "Old Guy."

December got its name from the Latin word decem (meaning ten) because it was originally the tenth month of the year in the Roman calendar, which began in March.

The December holidays can bring on many, many extra pounds. In addition to the most well-known religious days celebrated with food in December, there is National Fritters Day (December 1), National Brownie Day (December 8), National Pastry Day (December 9), National Ice Cream Day (December 13), and National Chocolate Day (December 24) and National Bacon Day (December 30).

Here are some historic days to remember:

December 1, 1990: England was connected to mainland Europe for the first time since the Ice Age as engineers digging a railway tunnel under the English Channel broke through the last rock layer to create the English Chunnel.

December 3, 1967: The first successful heart transplant was performed by Dr. Christiaan Barnard at Cape Town, South Africa, on Louis Washkansky, who lived for 18 days.

December 5, 1933: The 18th Amendment (Prohibition Amendment) to the U.S. Constitution was repealed. For nearly 14 years, since January 29, 1920, it had outlawed the manufacture, transportation, and sale of alcoholic beverages in the U.S.

December 6: Chanukah ends. The eight-day Jewish festival, beginning November 28, is also known as the Festival of Lights. On each day a Menorah (an eight branched candelabra) is lit with an ascending number of candles to match the day. The reason for Chanukah

is based on the story of the Maccabees battle with the Greeks. It is told that one pure bottle of olive oil lasted for eight days in the Holy Temple. It should have lasted only for the first day.

December 6, 1917: Two ships collided at Halifax, Nova Scotia, resulting in an explosion that killed more than 1,500 persons and injured 8,000. The Norwegian ship *Imo* collided with the French munitions ship *Mont Blanc* which was loaded with supplies for the war in Europe, including 5,000 tons of TNT. A tidal wave caused by the explosion destroyed much of the city.

December 6, 1877: At his laboratory in West Orange, New Jersey, Thomas Edison spoke the children's verse "Mary had a Little Lamb," while demonstrating his newly invented phonograph which utilized a revolving cylinder wrapped in tinfoil to record sounds.

December 7, 1941: The U.S. Naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, was attacked by nearly 200 Japanese aircraft in a raid that lasted just over one hour and left nearly 3,000 Americans dead.

December 11, 1998: The House Judiciary Committee approved three articles of impeachment charging President Bill Clinton with perjury and obstruction of justice.

December 14, 1918: British women voted for the first time in a general election and were allowed to run for office.

December 15, 1964: Canada adopted a new national flag featuring a red maple leaf on a white background.

December 21: Winter begins in the Northern Hemisphere. In the Southern Hemisphere today is the beginning of summer.

December 25: Christmas Day, commemorating the birth of Jesus of Nazareth. Although the exact date of his birth is not known, it has been celebrated on December 25 by the Western (Roman Catholic) Church since 336 A D

December 26, 2004: An estimated 230,000 persons were killed and 1.5 million left homeless when a magnitude 9.3 earthquake on the seafloor of the Indian Ocean set off a series of giant tsunami waves that smashed into the shorelines of a dozen countries including Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, India and Somalia.

December 26: Boxing Day in the United Kingdom and many other countries, a day of gift giving when boxes of

food, clothing and other gifts are traditionally given to employees, tradespeople and other service providers.

December 26 - January 1: Kwanzaa, an African American family observance established in 1966 celebrating traditional African harvest festivals, focusing on family unity, with a community harvest feast on the seventh day. Kwanzaa means "first fruit" in Swahili.

December 29, 1890: Members of the U.S. 7th Cavalry massacred more than 200 Native American (Sioux) men, women and children at Wounded Knee Creek, South Dakota.

December 31, 1781: The first bank in the U.S., the Bank of North America, received its charter from the Confederation Congress. It opened on January 7, 1782, in Philadelphia.

December 31: New Year's Eve, the final evening of the Gregorian calendar year, traditionally a night for merry-making to welcome in the new year.



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Wildlife Caution Notice

I remember helping my Mom make these for the holidays, back in the 50s!

Hot Cheese Olives

8 Tbsp. (1 stick) butter, softened

8 oz. (2 c.) grated extra-sharp cheddar cheese

1 1/2 c. flour

1/8 tsp. salt (omit if using salted butter)

1/4 tsp. ground cayenne

Dash of Worcestershire sauce

1 large egg

approx. 50 small pimento-stuffed cocktail olives, drained and

patted dry

Heat the oven to 350°F degrees. Beat the butter until creamy, in a large mixing bowl; add the cheese and mix well. Stir in the flour, salt, cayenne, and Worcestershire



sauce and mix until smooth. Beat the egg with 2 Tbsp. cold water. Add to the dough and mix just until incorporated. Refrigerate for 30 minutes.

Remove the chilled dough, and flatten out a piece, about the size of a walnut, into a thin round. Place an olive on top and shape it around the olive, pinching to repair any breaks. Place it on an ungreased cookie sheet. Repeat with the remaining dough and olives. Bake until the dough sets, about 15 minutes. Serve hot. (Makes about 4 doz.)

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
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Consumer Alert

Amazon Impersonators: What You Need To Know

or to tell you that your account has been hacked? According to the FTC's new *Data Spotlight*, since July 2020, about one in three people who have reported a business impersonator scam say the scammer pretended to be Amazon.

These scams can look a few different ways. In one version, scammers offer to "refund" you for an unauthorized purchase but "accidentally transfer" more than promised. They then ask you to send back the difference. What really happens? The scammer moves your own money from one of your bank accounts to the other (like your savings to checking account, or vice versa) to make it look like you were refunded. Any money you send back to "Amazon" is your money (not an overpayment) – and as soon as you send it out of your account, it becomes theirs. In another version of the scam, you're told that hackers have gotten access to your account – and the only way to supposedly protect it is to buy gift cards and share the gift card number and PIN on the back. Once that information is theirs, the money is, too.

Here are some ways to avoid an Amazon impersonator scam: Never call back an unknown number. Use the information on Amazon's website and not a number listed in an unexpected email or text.

Don't pay for anything with a gift card. Gift cards are for gifts. If anyone asks you to pay with a gift card – or buy gift cards for anything other than a gift, it's a scam.



The Race Committee would like to thank everyone for their great support in the past and we look forward to your on-going support in the future.

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
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
