"Surface Water Management," what does that mean and what does it do? Bet you never thought you would want to know about Surface Water Management. Neither did I. But, with all the waterways winding throughout our community, it is a very important infrastructure topic for all of us, believe it or not! Just look at the picture on this page to see the interaction of the waterways with the land and homes in our community!

We all enjoy the water, whether it is Charlotte Harbor, the Peace River, or all of the waterways that we have within our community. Just the aesthetic value of the vistas of our water, land, and homes together, along with the enjoyment of just having the water all around us, is one major item that attracts us to Florida, and to Burnt Store Marina. Some of our water comes directly from rain in our community, and some of our water flow comes from Burnt Store Road and Vincent Avenue.

Just a quick history. Every development in Florida, when

being first permitted, must submit to the county and state agencies a plan to remove the rainwater from the community in an orderly fashion, using swales, ditches, pipes, drains, etc. The water flow for our development goes from East to West, ending up in Charlotte Harbor. With all the environmental and safety issues, this is not an easy project. In our area, everything is flat, so when getting the water from one area into the next, the levels must be just a little different, with control mechanisms along the way.

Our waterways have different widths and lengths to take the water that comes into our community and basically flush it out into the harbor. All of our water flows into the Soundings Lake, located behind part of Matecumbe Key Road, and then filters out into the mangroves, and finally into Charlotte Harbor. Along the way are the various swales, ditches, pipes, and control mechanisms to channel the water properly.


Why is all of this important? Well, as owners of these waterways, we have the obligation to properly maintain them to insure the flow of water through our community. We are embarking on a maintenance program to insure the credibility of the waterways. Our first project was to shore up the levy on the Soundings Lake, which we completed last year.

Our next projects are to inspect all the pipes and drains to explore their condition, good or bad, and determine any maintenance that needs to be completed to bring them up to par. Also, we need to begin dredging areas where over the years the sediment at the bottom of the waterways has built up. This is to ensure the proper water flow from one waterway to another, and to repair some of the shore areas that we own, where we have experienced some erosion over the past 40 years.

The waterways that flow within our community are extremely important to all of us. To enjoy their beauty and interaction with everything else, we need to make sure that they are properly maintained. Next time you take a look at one of the waterways, think of how the water gets there, and where it goes afterward.

Telephone scams are on the rise in the area. Many of these calls are made by individuals overseas who have access to local numbers to fool you into taking their calls. This issue happens to all of us at some point and affects our friends and family members.

Here are a few tips to help you avoid being the next victim.

Telephone Scams

Telephone Scammers try to trick you out of money or get access to your personal information. Scams may come through phone calls from real people, robocalls or text messages. The callers often make false promises such as opportunities to buy products, invest your money or receive free product trials. They may also offer you money through free grants and lotteries. Some scammers may call with threats of jail or lawsuits if you don't pay them.

scams. However, federal agencies don't investigate individual cases of telephone scams.

• Report telephone scams to the Federal Trade Commission, either online or by phone at 1-877-382-4357. This is the primary government agency that collects scam complaints.

· Report all robocalls and unwanted telemarketing calls to the Do Not Call Registry.

• Report caller ID spoofing to the Federal Communications Commission, either online or by phone at 1-888-225-5322.

Also, report the scam to your state consumer protection office. Some consumer protection offices help residents resolve consumer problems.

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Holiday Golf Cart Decorating Tips

Beginning in July, we began posting monthly tips and suggestions for decorating your golf cart.

July's tips were:

• Pick a theme or name for your cart. (optional)

• Make sure your golf cart is fully charged on parade day.

• When decorating your golf, cart use LED Lights as they use less power.

August's tips were:

• Use tinsel to cover your cart before adding your lights.

 Stay away from strong tapes like strapping tape and clear duct tape. Use zip ties or scotch tape when attaching items to your cart.

• If you use tape to attach your decorations, it should be removed within 24 hours.

September's tips were:

• Use a spare battery to run lights. This way, you are not running your cart's battery down.

• If you are not using battery-operated lights, buy an inverter, and use it to run your lights. Walmart carries them. Check to see if your cart is 36 or 48 volts. They are inexpensive and last a long time.

October's tips are:

• Go online and Google "how to decorate golf carts for Christmas," or "golf carts decorated for Christmas," to get ideas.

• Use multi-color "under body glow lights." You can purchase them online.

• Use Command Strips, they will stick to metal and glass and can be removed easily.

With lots of residents returning and enjoying our pedestrian paths, I offer the following. All distances were measured with a GPS while riding in a golf cart.

• Islamorada Entrance Gate to Cape Cole Blvd. – 0.82 mile

Cape Cole Blvd., golf clubhouse gate arm to Islamorada Blvd. – 0.60 mile

· Cape Cole Blvd., golf club gate arm to Matecumbe Key entry -0.72 mile

• Matecumbe Key Blvd., construction entrance to Cape Cole Blvd., 0.72 mile

· Matecumbe Key Blvd., Cape Cole Blvd., to South Shore -0.55 mile

• Courtside Landings' Loop, start/stop at entrance – 0.48 mile

· Prosperity Point sidewalk loop, start/stop at Matcumbe Key Blvd, 1.26 mile

· Admiral's Point loop (includes Key Largo Lane Circle, Sable Key Circle and Key Largo Circle) start/stop at Marathon & Cape Cole Blvd., 1.06 mile

• Tarpon Pass loop, start/stop at Islamorada Blvd., 0.76 mile

How to Protect Yourself

Remember these tips to avoid being a victim of a telephone scam:

Do

• Register your phone number with the National Do Not Call Registry. You may register online or by calling 1-888-382-1222. If you still receive telemarketing calls after registering, there's a good chance that the calls are scams.

• Be wary of callers claiming that you've won a prize or vacation package.

• Hang up on suspicious phone calls.

• Be cautious of caller ID. Scammers can change the phone number that shows up on your caller ID screen. This is called "spoofing."

· Research business opportunities, charities, or travel packages separately from the information the caller has provided.

Don't

• Don't give in to pressure to take immediate action.

• Don't say anything if a caller starts the call asking, "Can you hear me?" This is a common tactic for scammers to record you saying "yes." Scammers record your "yes" response to use as proof that you agreed to a purchase or credit card charge.

· Don't provide your credit card number, bank account information, or other personal information to a caller.

• Don't send money if the caller tells you to wire money or pay with a prepaid debit card.

The name of the month originated when the Roman lunar calendar was used, and the year started in March, at harvest time. Then, October (octo) was considered the 8th month of the year. That changed in 46 B.C. when the new Julian calendar was used, making January the first month and October the tenth month in the calendar.

The early nights and breezy temperatures of October perfectly capture the spirit of autumn. As the month ends, children have one of their most loved holidays, as they dress as their favorite frightful characters for Halloween on the 31st. October is also home to numerous other national and international holidays, including Leif Erikson Day (October 9), Columbus Day – aka Indigenous Peoples Day (October 12) and Canada's Thanksgiving (second Monday of the month).

The two zodiac signs associated with the month of October are Libra and Scorpio. People born from October 1-22 are Libras. October is also celebrated as Breast Cancer Awareness Month, American Cheese Month, German-American Heritage Month and Bat Appreciation Month, to name a few. And...here are some fun and historic events occurring in October:

October 1, 1908: Henry Ford's Model T, a car designed for the masses, went on sale for the first time.

October 4: *National Golf Day* is a major charitable event, sponsored annually since 1952 by the PGA. The first event was held at Cog Hill Golf and Country Club, in Lemont, Illinois. The first event raised \$80,000 for charities.

October 6, 1927: The first "talkie" movie opened in New York. *The Jazz Singer,* starring Al Jolson, was the first full-length feature film using sound.

October 8, 1871: The Great Fire of Chicago erupted. According to legend, it started when Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lantern in her barn. Over 300 persons were killed and 90,000 were left homeless as the fire leveled 3.5 square miles, destroying 17,450 buildings. Financial losses totaled over \$200 million.

October 12, 1960: During a debate over colonialism in the United Nations, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev took off his shoe and pounded his desk repeatedly.

October 13: *National Fossil Day* was created in 2010 by the U.S. National Park Service. According to their website, National Fossil Day is "a celebration organized by the National Park Service to promote public awareness and stewardship of fossils, as well as to foster a greater appreciation of their scientific and educational values."

October 13, 1884: Greenwich was established as the universal time from which standard times throughout the world are calculated.

October 14, 1947: U.S. Air Force Captain Chuck Yeager became the first man to break the sound barrier, flying in a rocket-powered research aircraft.

October 17, 1777: During the American Revolution, British General Burgoyne and his entire army of 5,700 men surrendered to American General Gates after the Battle of Saratoga, the first big American victory.

October 19, 1781: The British Army marched out in formation and surrendered to the Americans at Yorktown. More than 7,000 British and Hessian troops, led by British General Lord Cornwallis, surrendered to General George Washington. The war between Britain and its American colonies was ended. The final peace treaty was signed in Paris on September 3, 1783.

October 21, 1879: Thomas Edison successfully tested an electric incandescent lamp with a carbonized filament at his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey, keeping it lit for over 13 hours.

October 21, 1915: The first transatlantic radio voice message was made by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, from Virginia to Paris.

October 24, 1945: The United Nations was founded.


October 26, 1881: The shoot-out at the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona, occurred between Billy Claiborne, Ike and Billy Clanton, and Tom and Frank McLaury on one side and town Marshal Virgil Earp, Special Policemen Morgan and Wyatt Earp, and temporary policeman Doc Holliday on the other side. The Earp brothers killed Billy Clanton and both McLaury brothers.

October 27, 1904: The New York City subway began operating, running from City Hall to West 145th Street, the first underground and underwater rail system in the world.

October 30, 1938: The *War of the Worlds* radio broadcast panicked millions of Americans. Actor Orson Welles and the Mercury Players dramatized the story by H.G. Wells depicting a Martian invasion of New Jersey. Their script utilized simulated radio news bulletins which many listeners thought were real.

Gardener's Wheelbarrow

Temperatures will finally begin to cool down in October, and most likely, rains will diminish. By the third week of this August, we had 1/3 more rain (9 inches) than last August's total

rainfall (6 inches). October begins our dry season - the weather should be much more comfortable to get out and clean up the areas you left alone, because it was too hot outside to work.

The shortening days of fall have a special effect on popular seasonal plants like poinsettias, Christmas cactus, kalanchoes and chrysanthemums. They start producing their flower buds at this time. Make sure that these plants don't receive any night light, or they may not bloom. Many varieties of citrus are ready for picking, now through January.

October's Checklist:

• Once summer's rains diminish, supplemental watering will be required for new plantings.

• Check your irrigation system's coverage. Whether from Mother Nature or from irrigation, the total amount of water in a 7-day period should be 1–1.5 inches. Watering twice a week is best.



• Temperature-wise, it's a great time to plant annuals, perennials, herbs, shrubs and trees; but rainfall is not reliable. You will probably need to hand water anything newly planted.

• Plan ahead...look for the "Burnt Store Marina: Landscaping Plants" document on the **www.bsm22.org** website. Click on Community Information > Documents & Forms > Committee Documents and Forms > Landscape Committee > BSM Landscaping Plants. This list will give you a better idea of what plant species do best here.

• Do a little research – if you are putting in new plants, check for sun/shade, drought and salt tolerance. And equally important, be aware of potential size of your plant choice before putting it into your landscape plan.

• Apply a high quality slow-release fertilizer to your turf, trees (including fruit-bearing and palms), shrubs, herbaceous perennials and annuals.

• When the temperature is below 80-85 degrees, apply herbicide to your turf to kill weeds. Look for sod webworm infestations and treat accordingly.

• Time to mulch! Organic mulch breaks down to enrich our not-so-good, sandy soil. Mulch has nutrients, and adds fiber, retaining moisture and texture for roots to grab onto and aerate the soil. Be certain your organic mulch isn't building up year after year. Rake and break it up to redistribute it.

• Rocks are becoming a new trend. Though they do not help to make better soil, and can increase the soil temperatures, they create a fresh, clean look. If you decide to use them, the optimum depth is 2-3".

• Palm Demise – A soil-borne fungus that kills a variety of palms is ganoderma butt rot. Older fronds will droop and hang parallel to the trunk, new growth will be smaller and pale and the new spear will die before opening up. Look at the base of the tree for the shelf-like conk or fungus. There is nothing that can be done to turn this around. Eventually, the palm will die. Ganoderma attacks all species of palms, and remains in the soil, after the affected palm is removed, for years. *It is not recommended that any type of palm be planted in the remaining soil.* Only palms are affected by this fungus.

• Palmetto Weevil – though very fond of the Canary Island date palm, it will also go after the Bismarck and coconut palms. There is a preventive treatment, but it must be applied BEFORE the weevil drills into the palm to lay its eggs. Your landscape maintenance contractor will be able to apply appropriate insecticide.

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Fit Happens... Getting Your Healthy Habits Back on Track -

With fall upon us and many of us returning to our Florida homes, it is a good time to

concentrate on getting back on track with healthy habits. With summer travel, visiting family and vacations, it is easy to get out of our healthy eating habits and fall off the wagon, so to speak. It can leave you feeling bloated, sluggish and weighed down by indulgences.

Even if you have a problem at times with willpower, there are things you can do to boost your success when it comes to being healthy, eating clean, and treating your body right! First thing, don't beat yourself up. Just because you may have gotten off track, that does not mean you totally lack willpower. Being positive has a lot of health benefits, including better cardiovascular health and better stress coping skills. So, forget the negative mindset and get motivated to get back on track. To help you get motivated remember your "why." For some, it might be to improve bloodwork. For others it may be to lose weight for a special occasion, or maybe you just want to feel better. Start by detoxing your kitchen. Get rid of tempting salty snacks, sugary sweets, and all those processed foods that wreak havoc with your health. Don't punish yourself by depriving yourself of all "treats" though. Choose a day to have a salty or sweet treat, just don't indulge every day. Plan your meals and snacks. Shop the perimeter of the grocery store, where you will find healthy fruits and vegetables, lean meats, and low-fat dairy, so you will have healthy choices available when hunger hits. Choose whole grains such as brown rice, whole wheat pasta and bread and whole oats, over processed grains. These are your complex carbohydrates that pack in more nutrients, are higher in fiber, and digest more slowly.

Go from "mindless" to "mindful" eating. Sit down at the table and eat slowly, being sure to listen to your body's signals of fullness. Beware of portion distortion. When eating those snacks, make sure you are looking at the serving size and measuring the proper amount. It is too easy to overindulge when you are eating straight out of the box or bag. You can also use your hand, which is suited to your body and always with you, as a gauge for portions. Your palm is the size for a serving of protein, your cupped hand is a serving size of pasta or whole grains, your fist is a serving of vegetables, and your thumb is a serving of fat.

Stay away from sugary drinks and watch your alcohol intake.

Wildlife Caution Notice

Owners are asked to use caution and be aware of local wildlife such as coyotes, bobcats, and alligators.

Coyotes sightings have increased as it is their mating season, and they are more aggressive and vocal right now. Recently a Burnt Store Lakes resident witnessed a coyote chase a rabbit into their rain gutter downspout and then pull the downspout into the yard trying to get the rabbit out.

Please watch your pets carefully and keep them on a leash when outside, particularly at dusk, nighttime, and dawn.

Smaller pets are especially at risk. Letting them out in a fenced area may not deter a coyote. Make sure pet food, fruit, or other items are stored inside or in tightly shut garbage cans. Ensure your home is not luring small rodents or animals that coyotes like to prey on.

One of the best attributes of living in Burnt Store Marina & The Lakes is the abundant wildlife. However, residents need to be aware of our wildlife and be cautious to ensure their own safety and the safety of their pets. Alcohol delivers a triple whammy of being high in calories, increases appetite and lowers inhibitions, which means you are more likely to binge. Try adding additional sugary drink and alcohol-free days each week to help keep you on track.

Get moving! If your regular exercise routine was disrupted during the summer, get back on track by scheduling your exercise like you would any important appointment, and put it on the calendar. Grammar Tips... Misused Words and Phrases

Sometimes we hear or read words that make us wonder if the speaker or writer really understands the words they are using. Most of the mistakes that are made are simply caused by faulty hearing, but others are made by people wanting to appear to be well educated. The following are examples of mistakes we, *The Grammar Police*, have heard or read recently:

Actual, Actually: "Actual" means existing in fact, as opposed to what was intended, expected, or believed. "Actually" is used to emphasize a contrast with what is expected to be true or real, and what it really is. Today, many people mistakenly use "actual" and "actually" to emphasize something's existence.

Existential: This word is concerned with existence, especially human existence as viewed in the theories of existentialism. If something is existential, it has to do with human existence. If you wrestle with big questions involving the meaning of life, you may be having an existential crisis. **Today, people are mistakenly using this word in place of "real" to give something more emphasis and importance.**

Premise vs. Premises: "Premise" means a theory or assumption. Some people think that "premises" is the plural form of "premise." Premises" is a building and its surrounding lands.

Nauseous vs. Nauseated: If something causes nausea, it is labeled as "nauseous," and makes people feel "nauseated."

Rappel vs Repel: "Rappel" is a verb meaning descending by means of a rope. "Repel" is also a verb, but meaning to turn (someone) away from something.

Second Annual St. Jude 5K in BSM




Thank you to all those that supported me over the past 5 years. I couldn't have done it without all of

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Rules of the Road

Motor Vehicles: Always drive your vehicle on the right side of the road. There are no "turn lanes" within Burnt Store Marina. Never drive your vehicle in lanes indicated for the use of bicycles and pedestrians. Always

stop at stop signs. Never exceed the posted speed limit. Bicycles: Always ride your bicycle on the right side of the road, even if there is no "bike lane" available. Use hand signals to indicate intention to turn. Always stop at stop signs. Never exceed the posted speed limit.

Golf Carts: Always drive your golf cart on the right side of the road. Use hand signals to indicate intention to turn. Always stop at stop signs. Use lanes indicated for the use of bicycles and pedestrians only when neither is present.

Pedestrians: Always use lanes provided for bicycles and pedestrians. If there is no lane available, use the left side of the street, facing wheeled traffic. Use caution when crossing streets. Wear reflective clothing and carry a flashlight when walking or running after sunset.

Plant of the Month...Palms

If you have ever been a Snowbird and driven the long trip down, south to Florida, you know that you're finally getting here when you start seeing palm trees. First, they are the low-growing palmettos here and there, then you start seeing some with more majestic height. Yeah! We're almost there!

Most palms are native to tropical and subtropical climates. Palm trees tolerate heat well. Most closely related to flowering grasses, palm trees do not produce limbs, but rather evergreen leaves called fronds. Palms can grow as either solitary or clustered "stems." An example of a solitary palm would be a royal palm; areca palms are an example of cluster-growing palms.



Palm leaves are either palmately compounded (leaf that has its leaflets radiating outwards from the end of the leafstalk), or pinnately compounded (a leaf where the leaflets are arranged along the middle vein). An example of a palmate-leafed would be the beautiful silver-leafed bismarck; while the royal palm has pinnate leaves.



Some palms are self-cleaning, meaning they shed their fronds, while others will need to be trimmed regularly to rid them of dead, brown fronds and falling fruit. Self-cleaning palms include royal, foxtail and areca palms; non-selfcleaning palms include queen, cabbage or coconut palms.



Which brings e to the fruit of the palm. Palms produce two kinds of fruit - coconuts and dates. Many assume that because we do not regularly eat dates from all date palm species, that they must not be edible. But all dates are edible. The most commercially important date palm is *Phoenix* dactylifera, the "true" date palm. The coconut palm, Cocos nucifera, is the only palm that produces coconuts.



To survive, palms require a minimum temperature range of 54-55 degrees Fahrenheit, and as much direct sunlight as possible every day. After planting a palm, it needs supplemental watering until it establishes. Do not let the soil dry out completely for the first several months, but also do not let it stand in soggy soil, or you will invite fungus. Most palm trees like moist and well-drained soil. Generally, it is best to plant palms in sand-based soil, like sandy loam, and moderately acid to slightly alkaline, ranging between 5.5 to 7.5 on the pH scale.

Always think twice before you plant palm trees in your yard. Are they low maintenance (self-cleaning)? How much space will they take after a few years of growth? Are they prone to thorns? Might they drop coconuts on my roof, car, pet or guests? There are over 2,600 species of palms to choose from...be sure to make the best choice.

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Reimagining Safe Harbor Burnt Store – **Meet the Man Behind the Mission** –

"Luck is what happens when preparation meets opportunity." This quote, from Roman philosopher Seneca, reminds us that we can make our own luck. It is not pure chance, rather it is our life experiences that allow us to be the right person, in the right

place, at the right time. Meet Jaret Rogers,

General Manager of Safe Harbor Burnt Store, a man of many talents and a man with a mission. And that mission is to make this marina the premiere destination for boaters on Florida's Gulf Coast. He is also a man who spent his whole life preparing himself for this job, even though he didn't know it. Jaret was born in Ft.



himself for this job, even *Jaret Rogers, son Jaxson and wife* though he didn't know it. *Casey*

Lauderdale, a place that began his life-long love of the water and lived there until he was five years old, when he moved with his family to a small town in North Georgia. Luckily, he was able to stay true to his natural draw to water by spending much of his time on Lake Allatoona. While it is not the ocean, it is 12,000 acres with 270 miles of shoreline. Unfortunately, Jaret's parents divorced when he was 14 years old, and he accompanied his Mom when she moved back to Florida.

As it turns out, being back in the land of surf and sea provided him with a new purpose as he sought opportunities to be near the water. This landed him a position as a lifeguard on the beaches of Jacksonville, and it awoke a desire to serve others in a more meaningful way. His passion and dedication in this area helped him become the youngest ever American Red Cross Life Saving Corps volunteer, which would set the course for his future success.

Circumstances led Jaret back to Georgia where he finished high school while living with his Dad, and continued his water activities on Lake Allatoona, always knowing he would get back to his roots in Florida. This desire came to fruition when Jaret moved back to Jacksonville in 2000. This marked the beginning of his career in hospitality.

Staying true to his love of the water, he worked as a bartender at an establishment on St. John's River, the longest river in Florida, that flows northward and empties into the Atlantic Ocean at Jacksonville. As Jaret matured in the hospitality business, moving from one establishment to another with increasing responsibilities, he grew restless and was ready to embark on a different journey.

After Jaret's summer as a lifeguard in Jacksonville, he held other types of summer jobs in Georgia that included landscaping and construction, which helped him understand how to run a business in a client-based industry that requires physical labor. This experience was a great foundation for the next chapter of his life which was delving into small business ownership as he and his best friend started a window cleaning company for both residential and commercial clients.

The business was an instant success with continued customer growth, and was financially sound. While it fulfilled Jaret's entrepreneurial spirit, it did not satisfy his soul. Jaret continually felt that something was missing, and that something was the sea. Therefore, in 2007, he and his partner took a risk and sold everything to move to St. John in the US Virgin Islands, to work for a water sports concierge company.

Being back in the hospitality industry, plus being on the water

Coral this time, which is where his Dad had moved.

Jaret decided to take a short sabbatical to go to school to get his captains' license, to be an Operator of an Uninspected Passenger Vessel (OUPV), and returned to the hospitality business working as a bartender, then bar manager at night. But more importantly, this is when the love of the sea took a back seat to the love of his life...this is when he met Casey, whom he married in 2011. As a newlywed, Jaret worked as a boat tour guide, and was the operator of a jet ski and parasail company in Fort Myers.

While he enjoyed the work on the water, Jaret and Casey wanted to start a family. He knew he needed to pivot and find a more stable, better paying position, so he took a sabbatical a second time to earn a Master Class Captain degree. It was during this time that he landed a position in 2013 as Assistant Harbormaster at Burnt Store Marina, when it was owned by Realmark Development. This appealed to all of Jaret's desires, being close to the water, being in hospitality and being in a stable, non-traveling position, now that he was a new Dad with the recent birth of his son.

Jaret's background in construction and small business ownership was the cornerstone of his success in this position. He was responsible for almost everything at the Marina including billing, dock infrastructure maintenance, fuel and pump out regulatory adherence, staff supervision and, sometimes janitor. There was little capital investment at this time, and he did whatever was necessary to keep the marina as intact and safe as possible for slip renters and guests. In 2016, the marina was sold to Castlelake L.P., and a new interim GM came on board who heavily relied on Jaret due to his stellar past performance, and in-depth knowledge of the day-to-day intricacies of running the Marina. It was common knowledge that Castlelake was not interested in being a long-term owner of the Marina, but it did provide a small maintenance allowance that Jaret gladly used to patch up areas that were in dire need of repair.

In January of 2017, Safe Harbor Marinas purchased Burnt Store Marina and immediately recognized Jaret's passion for the place, as well as his hard work ethic, and desire to bring the marina to a higher standard. Because of this, he was quickly promoted to General Manager, and was the culmination of the saying that luck is being prepared to take advantage of an opportunity when it presents itself.

For Jaret, the work as General Manager wasn't much different than what he had done for years. What was different is that Safe Harbor and he shared the same mantra as it pertained to hospitality and customer service. They believed that the slip renters and company personnel should be treated as family, that they deserved to be put first, and provided with the best care and support as possible.

Safe Harbor brought in a new mindset towards running the marina. They infused it with much needed investment dollars to rebuild deteriorating docks, replace more than 1,500 feet of sea wall in the north and south basins damaged by *Hurricane Irma*, streamline IT systems, upgrade electrical and fire infrastructure, improve the exterior of the Dockmaster Building and Cass Cay, and plan a major expansion of the Dry Dock area that took three years to come to fruition.

While all these projects keep Jaret very busy, he does find time to relax with his wife Casey and seven-year-old son Jaxson and fur baby Charlotte (yes, named after Charlotte Harbor!), a German Shorthaired Pointer. As a family, they enjoy off-roading with friends in their side-by-side and bowling. Jaret's personal "therapy" is cooking and grilling.

The future is bright for Safe Harbor Burnt Store, and with the continued stewardship of Jaret Rogers, it very well could be the most sought-after location for boaters on Florida's Gulf Coast. It is an appropriate conclusion for a man who never outgrew his love of the sea, and combined that with his passion to serve, and his desire to succeed. He ended up in exactly the place where he is supposed to be. Yes, Jaret is a lucky man, but not because of chance!





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Tight Lines...Nurse Sharks on the Prowl

On my last fishing trip, I noticed a large number of nurse sharks roaming the shallow flats. Some of the sharks looked to be 6', with some larger. As a result, I decided to go into my files, and found excellent references from a lecture I attended by world



renowned fisheries marine biologist, Dr. Jose' I. Castro. Dr. Castro worked for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and as a senior scientist at Mote Marine Laboratory. The lectures were sponsored by the Southwest Florida Fossil Society. With a little luck, I got to spend some quality time with Dr. Castro in a discussion about the sharks of North America especially the nurse sharks. I hope to pass along some of the facts he presented during our discussion.

The nurse shark is from the family *ginglymostomatidae*, which have nasal barbs (whiskers), with the first dorsal fin located back over the pelvic fin. They are slow moving, bottom dwelling sharks that inhabit our waters all year long. Identified by their whiskers, they basically have no food value. Rarely do you see their fins for sale and almost never their steaks. One of the most remarkable features is their fine denticles or scales. Frequently you will see leather belts and wallets coming out of Mexico for sale in the U.S. Market made of nurse shark skin. Their teeth are quite small, but fill their upper and lower jaws for feeding on crabs, shrimp, small fish and squid.

Because they are known to stay in their habitat all year long, they are popular with the tourists from southwest Florida to the Keys. Many dive boats bring tourists to spots where they can dive with large schools of these sharks. When the water is clear in our area, many of these nurse sharks will be spotted swimming under fishermen's boats or close to wade fisherman. They are not known to attack humans, but if provoked they will give you a good bite. Many visitors will say they are killer sharks because they are so large and nasty looking, but that is anything but the truth.

Some anglers enjoy trying to locate a school of nurse sharks, and try their hand at catching one. Because of their size, larger stouter equipment should be used. It is possible to land one accidentally on lighter tackle, since they do not put up a real nasty fight. That is until they see the boat or shore. They are frequently caught in the surf as well. The recommended tackle for fishing these sharks is the selection of a 5' 6" up to a 7' fishing rod. A conventional rod and reel is suggested. The rod should be rated for line starting at 30 lb. test. Heavier rated line is usually a better match. Reels rated at the International Game Fish Association standard of 30 lb. or better is ideal. Most anglers will spool the reel with 80-to-100-lb. test. A wire leader of three feet will do, connected to a strong monofilament leader of 200-lb. test. That line is directly connected to the main fishing line spooled onto the reel. Since these nurse sharks are generally bottom feeders, you send the line out away from the boat or surf with a bait that will sink to the bottom. A light sinker of about 1 oz. attached with a rubber band to the wire leader helps keep the bait on the bottom. The sinker generally breaks off when the fish starts it's run off the bottom.

The fight will be moderate until you try to disgorge the hook from the shark's mouth. Because their body is almost all cartilage, they can turn and twist violently, usually causing a bite, or worse, a hook that flies loose and digs into your

Improving Gated Community Safety

Lee County hosts an extensive number and variety of gated communities. They vary in resident p o p u l a t i o n , configuration and



safety components. These communities utilize a variety of barriers for safety and privacy ranging from shrubbery to fencing to stone.

What all communities share is the potential for criminal access.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) has been benefiting from the use of license plate readers, or LPRs, to identify stolen vehicles, missing persons, and cars or trucks involved in illicit activity.

"Hot-lists" can be preloaded into license plate readers. When a prestored vehicle plate is captured by the LPR, law enforcement can be immediately alerted to the location of the vehicle.

As the vast majority of community-related crimes involve the use of a vehicle, it is enormously helpful

to law enforcement to have real-time access to vehicle description and tag information for all vehicles entering and leaving a community.

The Lee County Sheriff's Office Real Time Information Center can immediately dispatch this information to units in and around the impacted community. The results are notable, stolen property is often recovered, arrests are made, and prosecutions become solidified.

At this time, communities within our county are installing license plate readers for added safety. The costs involved are negligible and provide a proactive and reactive technology for Lee County Sheriff's Office applications.

It is recommended to cut the leader close to the mouth, and let the hook decay and rust out naturally from the shark's mouth. Never use stainless hooks as they will not rust out and perhaps kill the shark.

Dr. Castro is frequently seen on T.V., especially during the annual shark week productions. His many publications can be purchased online, and each is a worthwhile addition to a fisherman's library.





Million-Dollar Spaghetti (serves 8)

1 (8 oz.) package spaghetti (or other pasta)

1 lb. lean ground beef

1 onion, diced

1-2 cloves garlic, minced 1 (24 oz.) jar spaghetti

sauce 1/4 c. butter, sliced 4 oz. cream cheese,



1 (8 oz.) container cottage cheese (or ricotta)

1/4 c. sour cream

softened

2 c. (8 oz.) shredded cheddar or mozzarella cheese (or both)

1/4 c. parmesan cheese

Cook spaghetti according to package instructions; drain and combine with half of the spaghetti sauce. In a large skillet, brown ground beef with onions and garlic. Drain and combine with remainder of sauce. Set aside.


In a bowl, combine cream cheese, cottage cheese, sour cream and half of the shredded cheese. Add the butter slices to the bottom of a 9x13 inch casserole and top with half of the spaghetti mixture. Top with all of the cheese mixture, following with the remaining half of the spaghetti. Add the remaining meat sauce and top with the remaining shredded cheese and parmesan. Bake uncovered for 30-35 minutes at 350°F.

books on birds, and One of the John James Audubon shell art will also be *illustrated panels displayed in The* featured. The exhibit *Birds of Southwest Florida exhibit* is included with *at Edison and Ford Winter Estates* admission to the site

and will run until mid-January 2022.

The exhibit is a tribute to Mina Edison (Thomas Edison's wife) and her love of birds. A dedicated conservationist long before the word entered popular vocabularies; she was an ardent supporter, advocate, and unofficial spokeswoman for several organizations, including the Chautauqua Association (where she served as president of the Bird, Tree, and Garden Club), the National Audubon Society, and School Garden Association of America. As an integral part of the Chautauqua Association, she was one of many who helped establish the foundation's arboretum, a botanical garden dedicated to trees, which in affect created more potential nesting and breeding grounds for Chautauqua's indigenous bird population.

As a member of the National Audubon Society, she helped bring awareness to issues that had a negative impact on birdlife and was essentially involved in a national movement that would help spur vital legislation protecting wild North American bird species, as well as the creation of America's first real system of waterbird sanctuaries along the east coast. Members' collective efforts facilitated the implementation of scientificallybased conservation efforts.

Mina was also good friends with Jay N. "Ding" Darling, the Pulitzer Prize-winning cartoonist and conservationist who was President Franklin Roosevelt's director of the United States Biological Survey, which was the precursor of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. On a couple of occasions during the early 1940s, Mina invited Darling to be an honored guest for lunch at her Fort Myers estate. His signature bird drawings can be seen in Mrs. Edison's official Seminole Lodge Guest Book located inside the museum.

In 1928, she co-founded and served as the first president of the Fort Myers Round Table, an influential group of community leaders that advocated for civic improvements, such as beautification of the city's landscape, cleaning up vacant lots, removing dilapidated buildings, refurbishing the Fort Myers railroad station, and planning new parks. A few years later, she took an active role in personally advocating for bird-friendly landscaping as part of a larger campaign to establish neighborhood gardens.

Mina's fascination with birds compelled her to create a safe-haven and refuge for several different species at Seminole Lodge. She had purple martin houses installed over the Caloosahatchee River near the property's seawall and pier, small feeding tables were created by staff in order to watch a variety of birds from her porch, and birdboxes were built and mounted around various parts of the property. She had a pet peacock named "Beauty" that roamed the estate and according to support staff, would open its feathers if spoken to in a gentle manner. Beauty was later preserved and can now be seen as part of the Mina Edison exhibit located in the museum at the estates.

Mina deeded the Edison Winter Estate to the City of Fort Myers in February of 1947 for one dollar, with the purpose of serving as a tribute to her late husband and a botanical garden for future generations of visitors. She died shortly thereafter on Aug. 24, 1947, at the age of 82. She was fondly remembered by those who knew her best for her kindness, generosity, and community activism. **About Edison And Ford Winter Estates**

Edison and Ford Winter Estates is the internationally known winter homesite of Thomas Edison and Henry Ford. More than 220,000 visitors walk through the location each year from all around the globe. 

Question: Where is the biggest Halloween parade in the United States?

Answer: Manhattan's Greenwich Village has been hosting its annual Halloween parade for 47 years, each year going more above and beyond than the previous one.

Question: What inspired the name "jack-o'-lantern"?

Answer: The name jack-o'-lantern originated from an Irish folktale about a man named Stingy Jack who tricked the devil over and over again. When Jack died, he was forced to walk the Earth with only a carved-out turnip with a burning coal in it to help light his way.

Question: From where did the tradition of pumpkin carving come?

Answer: People in Ireland and Scotland began carving turnips, beets, and potatoes with Stingy Jack's scary "face" to replicate the carved-out turnip with which Jack roamed the earth. When the Irish brought the tradition to America, pumpkins were carved more often because they were native to the United States and were more plentiful.

Question: From where did the superstition around black cats come?

Answer: It has been said that it's bad luck for a black cat to cross your path, especially on Halloween night. In the United States, this superstition stems from the Protestant beliefs of the Puritan Pilgrims of Plymouth Colony. They disapproved of anything associated with witchcraft, and some believed the legend that witches could transform into and back from black cats.

Answer: At one time, it was customary to perform dances, songs, prayers, and plays - a practice called "mumming" - in order to receive treats.

Question: On average, how much do parents spend on Halloween?

Answer: In 2017, the U.S. Census Bureau estimated there were 41 million trick-or-treaters ages 5 to 14 in America. According to the National Retail Federation's 2019 report, Halloween party-goers spend an average of \$86 each, making the total expected estimate about \$8.8 billion on the holiday overall. Question: What is the most produced Halloween candy?

Answer: Since its 1898 invention by confectionary company Herman Goelitz, candy corn has been widely produced. Today, nearly 35 million pounds of this candy is produced each year.

Question: True or false: Halloween is the largest consumer holiday in the United States.

Answer: False. However, Halloween is a big business with all of the costumes, sweet treats, and spooky outdoor decor. So big, in fact,

that it's the second-largest commercial holiday in America, with Christmas being the only one to surpass it in sales.

Question: How long does leftover candy last?

Answer: Dark and milk chocolates can last up to two years if stored in a dry, odor-free spot. Hard candy can last up to a year, and unopened packages of candy corn can last nine months.

Question: True or false: Halloween generates more candy sales than Valentine's Day.

Answer: True. Valentine's Day is no longer the sweetest national holiday - at least when it comes to candy sales. More than twice as much chocolate is sold on Halloween, averaging about 90 million pounds during the week of Oct. 31 alone. In total, about \$2.6 billion is spent on Halloween candy each year.

Question: Why is it hard to adopt black cats in October?

Answer: If you've always wanted to adopt a black cat, don't bother going to the shelter on Halloween - or maybe even the entire month of October. Many shelters refuse to put these cats up for adoption in the weeks before the holiday, as they're worried the animals will be used in some sort of sacrifice. But it really depends on where you go. The ASPCA, for example, provides a list of black cat adoption promotions that are actually tied to the holiday.

Question: Why do people dress up in costumes for Halloween?

Answer: The tradition of dressing up as our favorite celebrities, cartoon characters, and superheroes stems from the ancient festival Samhain where people would dress up in animal heads and skins to keep ghosts away.

Question: How often is there a full moon on Halloween? Answer: According to The Old Farmer's Almanac, a full moon on Halloween only happens approximately every 19 years.

Question: What percentage of parents admit to stealing their kids' Halloween candy?

Answer: Seventy-two percent of parents have admitted to stealing their kids' Halloween candy. Can you blame them?











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
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
