President's Comments

Like most areas in Florida, our community has experienced a big turnover in home sales and purchases. Those who have been here for some time decided to take advantage of the higher sale prices and move on. Those coming to the area have been willing to pay higher prices in order to gain access to the residential market in Florida, and have gratefully picked our community. So we have been, and are, experiencing a major turnover of population within our community.

So, I thought we might give some history to those that are new to our community over the past three or so years. First, our community is a deed restricted community, meaning that in order to own a home here there are restrictions, rules and regulations that are attached to the right of ownership.

We are a unique development in Southwest Florida in that not only do we have a marina that is one of a kind on the southwest coast, but we also have a 27-hole golf course. These two major amenities are crucial to our community retaining its value as we begin to have more competition up and down Burnt Store Road.

Here is a quick review of the past five years. In 2015, because the owner/developer fell into bad times, a new owner/developer bought the defaulted notes to the bank. They became the owner of the marina, the golf course, the fitness center, roads and waterways. In 2016, that owner was going to sell all the parcels, except the marina, to whomever they could, but first offered to sell them to PGI Section 22 HOA. They also began the sale of the marina to Safe Harbor.

In 2016 and 2017, our community, by 88% voting yes, overwhelmingly decided to buy the parcels by voting in three different elections to change our documents and gave approval to the HOA to buy everything but the marina. The community decided it was better to own, operate, and make sure that these amenities would remain open, successful, and a value to our community for the activities they offer, and the value that they add to our properties and daily living, rather than living under the umbrella of an outside owner.

In 2017 we took ownership and began the process to update all our purchased assets to bring them back to a functional standard after 30 to 35 years of neglect by previous owners. This was no different than our present homeowners putting on new roofs, resurfacing driveways, replacing irrigation systems and updating the inside of their new homes.

We continue to put time, effort, funds and planning into the infrastructure components of the assets we purchased, to bring them back to respectability and use for our community. The pandemic in 2020 and most of 2021 put us behind in some of our planning and projects. For 2022, we are seeing a comeback of our amenities, and resuming the projects that are needed to finally get our assets and amenities to a respectful standard of operations and use.

For our community to be healthy, we will need to properly fund the current daily operations. This will enable us to maintain and upgrade the current assets so they are in good working order

and aesthetically pleasing, and have reserve funds for the future, known and unknown, needs of the community.

As we go into 2022 our community is getting stronger each year. We are fortunate to have so much more to offer than other newer developments in our area. We are a complete package, and we strive each year to maintain and improve upon what we have for those of us here now, and for those that come in the future.

Finally, and most importantly, we do have the friendliest and most giving residents that you can find throughout Florida. Many new residents and outsiders have commented on the strength of our residents and volunteers who bring so much knowledge and ability for any and all causes that need to be dealt with on a daily basis. are available, and can be very handy especially with the colder weather. You can find quilted and weather resistant ones for both dogs and humans. Also, blinking light collars, attachable collar lights and light up leashes can be as strong as a flashlight and make others aware of where your dog is.

You can find collars and leashes with reflective material on them which can be effective as well. You can even buy a roll of reflective tape to put on your dog's collar/leash and your own jacket if you are looking for something you can add to already existing items. If you don't have any of these things, wearing light or bright colors is always very important when in the dark.

Another helpful accessory is a light-up pooper-scooper

or combination flashlight/waste bag holder. Even though it is dark out, it is still important to pick up after your pet if you are in a public area.

2. Choose a Well-Lit Path

When walking your pet at night you want to make sure you are walking somewhere that you can be seen from all angles. Choose a path that is likely to have activity. This can also help to avoid environmental hazards such as allergens or aggressive animals.

3. Illuminate Your Path

The best way to do this is to bring a flashlight so you can see where you and your dog are stepping. This can also help you when picking up after your pet. This frees up your hands to better handle your pet, and any other situations that may arise during your walk.

4. Use Caution

You should always be aware of what is going on around you during a walk at any time of day. Since visibility is decreased at night, you should be even more aware of any sounds or movements going on around you. Make sure you bring a charged cell phone in case anything does happen, so you can easily get in contact with help. Your pet should also always have ID tags, even during the daytime, in the event that you lose sight of him/ her. Try to free up your hands as much as possible; utilize pockets so you can focus on your dog.

If walking in the road, make sure to walk against traffic, and use sidewalks whenever possible. When a car is coming your way, be sure to give them the right of way. Unless they clearly give you the signal to go, wait for the car to pass before crossing the road.

If this is your first walk in the dark with your pet, and you're a little nervous, bring a human friend along! Your dog will feel more comfortable when you're comfortable, so make sure you are relaxed on your walk. Don't let the dark stop you and your dog from maintaining an active lifestyle. Grab that light-up leash and warm reflective jacket and get out there!

With lots of residents returning and enjoying our pedestrian paths, I offer the following. All distances were measured with a GPS while riding in a golf cart.

- Islamorada Entrance Gate to Cape Cole Blvd. 0.82 mile
- Cape Cole Blvd., golf clubhouse gate arm to Islamorada Blvd -0.60 mile
- Cape Cole Blvd., golf club gate arm to Matecumbe Key
- Matecumbe Key Blvd., construction entrance to Cape Cole Blvd., 0.72 mile
- Matecumbe Key Blvd., Cape Cole Blvd., to South Shore -0.55 mile
- Courtside Landings' Loop, start/stop at entrance 0.48

• Prosperity Point sidewalk loop, start/stop at Matcumbe Key Blvd, 1.26 mile

- Admiral's Point loop (includes Key Largo Lane Circle, Sable Key Circle and Key Largo Circle) start/stop at Marathon & Cape Cole Blvd., 1.06 mile








Fit Happens...Heart Health

Now that the holidays are behind us, you have probably started to think about plans to improve



your heart health. The heart is the most important muscle in the body. Working around the clock, it carries oxygen to every cell. As we age, the risk for developing some form of cardiovascular disease is greater. Cardiovascular disease is a term for all the diseases affecting the heart and blood vessels. It is considered the silent killer, especially for women, because it often does not display any telltale

symptoms. Poor diet, lack of exercise, smoking, infection, and unlucky genes contribute to cardiovascular disease.

Atherosclerosis is the accumulation of cholesterol inside the arteries. Cholesterol plaques can break apart, disrupt blood flow, and cause a heart attack or stroke. Steps can be taken at any age to lower the risk of heart disease. Keep tabs on your blood pressure readings, cholesterol values and get regular checkups. Eat healthy and stay within a reasonable daily calorie limit, using proper serving sizes. Choose a variety of fruits and vegetables, and increase fiber by adding whole grains. Eat healthy fish fat such as tuna, salmon, and sardines, which provides Omega 3 fatty acids. Select lean red meats, low fat dairy and watch the amount of saturated fat by reading nutrition labels. Lower sodium

content by cutting back on packaged foods, and if possible, prepare meals fresh. Keep blood sugar under control and limit alcohol consumption to 1 drink for women and 2 drinks for men. Smoking and secondhand smoke should be avoided. Always follow directions for taking medications.


Another way to lower your risk is to get active. Aim for 30 minutes a day. Before beginning an exercise program, talk to your doctor. Bicycling, walking and swimming are good activities, and there are many classes at the fitness center to choose from. Using a fitness tracker is a great motivator because it provides a stimulus for improvement.

These guidelines are a great start to improving heart health. After all, our heart beats about 2.5 billion times during our lifetime. That is just amazing!

- 1 lb. ground chicken (or turkey)
- 1 egg
- 1/2 c. Panko breadcrumbs
- 1/2 c. grated parmesan cheese
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. onion powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt

black pepper to taste additional seasonings (optional)

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Line a baking sheet with foil and a little cooking spray. Mix all the ingredients together in a mixing bowl. Roll the




mixture into balls. Place on baking sheet. Bake for 25-30 minutes. (Time will vary according to meatball size.)

- Pruning Cold sensitive plants should not be pruned. Pruning encourages new growth that is tender and susceptible to cold damage. Dead and diseased wood can be removed at any time.
- Remove spent blossoms (dead-heading) to promote continued bloom.
- Ornamental grasses (fakahatchee, cord, muhly, purple and white fountain) need a severe haircut to within 6 - 12 inches of the ground. This is also a good time to spray for any red spider mites.
- African Iris also should be cut to several inches above ground level.
- Fertilize tropical and flowering ornamentals (bush allamandas, gardenia, ixora and hibiscus) with a slow-release fertilizer. Remember that fertilizer contains salts. Excess salt burns root hairs. Time your fertilizing, if possible, with the rains. Watering before and after fertilizing makes for very happy plant roots.
- Look for damaged leaves brought to you by your local cutworms. They are nocturnal eaters. Spray with Organocide or a similar product. Pick 'n smash is the most expedient method.
- Fungus on Ornamentals If you see round dark "bulls-eye" areas on leaves, black stems, and brown patches in turf – treat it! Fungus is common to our area. Prevent it by providing good air circulation around shrubs.
- Brown Spot Fungus Avoid watering excessively and use nitrogen judicially at this time of the year. Fungicides are mostly preventive measures. Irregular dead-looking areas in the lawn signal brown spot fungus.

Do not walk through it! Doing so transfers the spores to other areas.

- Irrigation Maintenance It is important for you or your irrigation technician to verify each sprinkler head's coverage on a regular (monthly) basis. Over time there will be adjustments needed in the system to accommodate plant growth.
- Cold Temperatures? Tropical plants adversely react to cold temperature below 50 degrees. So, you can imagine what temperatures in the 30s will do to them! Hopefully we will get by without any frost in February, but it can occur until late in the month as it did in 2009.

It's Caladium time! Lake Placid caladium growers are now shipping their bulbs. Since this Florida town is considered the Caladium Capital of the World, you can expect them to grow beautifully here. Although some do okay in our sandy ground, they prefer rich moist soil, a bit of shade and fresh water. They do beautifully in containers and are often sold in hanging baskets. Caladiums are grown for their amazing leaf color and patterns. They also come in categories by height (12-30" in a single season) and light requirements (full shade to some sun). Fertilize sparingly, and every couple of weeks, remove the dead or damaged leaves. Contact www.caladiumworld.com, www.happinessfarms.com, www.floridaboyscaladiums.com, or any of the other Lake Placid growers to order your bulbs. You won't be disappointed.

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Plant of the Month...Caladiums

With lush multi-colored leaves, many of them as large or larger than the palm of your hand, caladiums are perfect foliage plants for shady or semi-shady gardens. Each leaf seems to be hand painted with striking combinations of green, white, pink and red. The best landscapes use different leaf colors and textures to create interest, and caladiums really fill in shady areas beautifully.

These tropical South American natives thrive in hot, humid weather. With a little pampering, these exotic shade dwellers create glorious displays rivaling that of any brightly flowering plant. Caladiums do produce flowers, but they are not showy, and are insignificant. And, because caladiums are natives of the tropics, they crave heat and only flourish in warm air and soil temperatures... all summer long in south Florida.

You will see potted caladiums in nursery centers as early as March, but tubers can be purchased online in February. Tubers generally come in three sizes: medium (No. 2), large (No. 1), and jumbo. Larger tubers typically produce more leaves and grow faster. If you order early, you can start your tubers in pots and keep them in a sheltered area if temperatures are still cool.

Plan to plant your tubers in filtered sun or shade, with the exception of newer varieties that can tolerate more sunlight. Leaf colors are often more vibrant when grown in shade. Because some have large leaves, locate plants in a spot sheltered from strong winds to avoid damage. Plant in moist, rich, well-drained soil, amended by compost or other organic matter. Wait until daytime temperatures are 70 to 85 degrees and nighttime temperatures stay above 60. Plant them in garden beds about $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches deep with the pointed end (stem) pointing up. Space plants about 8 to 12 inches apart, based on their size at maturity.

Provide enough moisture throughout the growing



season to keep the soil evenly moist. If you allow the soil to dry out, the leaves may yellow and drop. Apply a layer of mulch around your plants to help retain moisture. Caladiums don't need a lot of fertilizer, and using too much can burn the leaves.

They will die back in winter, but you don't need to



do anything with them while they are dormant. In the spring, before they come back, apply liquid fertilizer – like Miracle Gro – to the beds and begin keeping the soil moist again.

Now...sit back and enjoy your caladiums, as they come back year after year!



In History:

Liaison to the Section 22 HOA Board was Rachel Martin. This issue marks 20 years of service to the community...Happy Birthday to *The Beacon!*

February 4, 1985: The United Nations signed a document entitled "Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment." 20 countries participated in the signing.

February 19, 1913: A prize was inserted into a Crackerjacks box for the first time.

February 23, 1945: U.S. Marines raise the America flag in Iwo Jima. Just four days after arriving, U.S. Marines captured Mount Suribachi, on Iwo Jima's south side, famously raising an American flag at the summit. That image was captured by Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal, who won a Pulitzer Prize for the iconic photograph.

February 27, 1951: *The 22nd Amendment* to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, limiting the president to two terms.

February 16: Fat Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday. It is also known as Mardi Gras Day or Shrove Day. It is a day when people eat all they want of their favorite foods, as the following day is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the fasting

period for Christians called Lent. In addition to fasting, Christians also give up something that they especially enjoy. So, Fat Tuesday is a celebration, and the last opportunity to enjoy the food, snack or beverage that is given up for the Lenten season, the 46 days before Easter.

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Tight Lines...Burnt Store Anglers Celebrate Their 20th Anniversary

In 2002, 18 anglers informally got together to talk about starting a fishing club to promote fishing, and share their experiences here at Burnt Store Marina. For the



previous several years, a small group of fishermen met each Thursday out on the water to share a good day of fishing. These anglers came from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Connecticut, Florida, Alabama, and a few states we actually can't remember. At days end, many great fishing stories were exchanged. After one of those fishing trips Jay Lev and longtime resident Ron Doig met during a golf game and talked about starting a fishing club. It was agreed that both Ron and Jay would casually talk to their fishing buddies, and see if there was any interest in forming a fishing







club. The response was mostly positive, and Ron and Jay made arrangements to have a meeting of anyone who was interested in helping to organize a new fishing club here at Burnt Store Marina. Expecting only 18 or so anglers to attend, over 80 interested men and woman anglers came to help get a fishing club off the ground. For the next month, discussions were informally held, and a search for volunteers to head

committees for the possible organization of a new fishing club was underway. In February 2002, the Burnt Store Anglers was formed. Artist Stan Hochstadt volunteered to design a club logo and Jay Lev was voted the first club President. Ron Doig was voted Vice President and Tournament Chairman, and a number of volunteers took on positions of Membership Chairperson, Treasurer, Program Chairperson and Communications Chairperson.

Each month thereafter, the Burnt Store Anglers met to enjoy informative programs. The first speaker for the Anglers was Dr. Aaron Adams whose new publication titled Fishermen's Coast an Angler's Guide to Marine Warm-Water Gamefish and Their Habitats was a great guide to all our members. Dr. Adams was the Program Manager of the Fisheries Habitat Ecology Program for Mote Marine Laboratory field station at Charlotte Harbor. Dr Adams was a welcomed speaker, and often spoke to the Anglers on fishing topics before he relocated to Key West as head of the Keys Marine Research Center. Other speakers for the Anglers were Captain Robert Moore, a well-known local fishing guide, Captain Rhett Morris Guide, Fishing Frank and Robert Lugewitcz owner and manager of Fishing Franks tackle. The Anglers also enjoyed a presentation by marine biologist Gina Russo, a speaker from Florida Fish and Wildlife, and over 30 other outstanding fisherman and conservationists.

During their development as a fishing club, the Anglers also offered many learning opportunities to new saltwater fishermen. For over 7 years the Anglers offered their Annual Fishing School. The school, organized by Jay Lev, included instructors who helped form the Anglers including George Folio, Ted Morand, Mary Bergman, Joel Spector and Pete Heber representing the Coastal Conservation Association. Courses on fishing rod building, cast net throwing and navigation, to name a few, were offered annually as a sponsored event of the Burnt Store Anglers.

To help attract new members to fishing in Charlotte Harbor,





the Anglers organized and ran a large local fishing tournament. Among the tournament directors from the Burnt Store Anglers, who were instrumental in organizing the fun charity tournament, was Ron Doig, Jay Lev, and longtime tournament director Gene Weidemoyer. Gene was very successful in organizing a dedicated group of anglers, who volunteered to make the Tournament into a very large and popular community event. At Gene's suggestion, and right after the passing of co-founder of the Burnt Store Anglers Ron Doig, the Tournament was renamed in honor of Ron. The annual tournament is now called the Ron Doig Memorial Burnt Store Anglers Community Tournament. Because of the huge success of the tournament and Gene's outstanding committee of volunteers, the tournament raised funds used for annual contributions, some of which were given to Ron Doig's favorite charities. The Punta Gorda Elks Annual Kids Fishing Tournament and many of our local food kitchens were the recipients. As part of the Burnt Store Anglers commitment to our community, the Anglers organized a tournament called Fins and Skins. It consisted of 9 holes of golf and 2 hours of fishing in one of the dedicated golf course retention ponds. The Anglers provided rods and reels, bait and angler guides, including John Oemig, Dave Roop and Mary Bergman. Some remarkable catches were made including a huge piece of sheet metal caught by Joyce Punt, a nasty small alligator caught and released by Bob Wood, many largemouth bass, and a prize winning snake head fish caught by angler and golfer Paula Allton.

The Anglers also joined members of the Ladies Golf League who sponsored a large golfing event to benefit the Susan G Komen Foundation. For the many non-golfers, the Anglers also ran a large fishing tournament known as the FISH FOR THE CURE. Over \$2000 raised by the anglers was also contributed to the Komen Foundation. As part of their community and conservation efforts, the Burnt Store Anglers also conducted many additional fun and charitable activities. The repair and

cleanup of the spoil islands was conducted for several years with project coordinators Joel Spector and George Folio leading the way. Planting of over 3000 mangroves pods was conducted by angler teams under the direction of Charlotte Harbor conservation organizations. Today it is estimated that over 50% of the plantings are helping stop erosion in the harbor. A fun "Fish from The Wall Tournament" was run each year under the leadership of Marv Bergman. This tournament was open to all anglers and their families regardless of their affiliation as a Burnt Store Angler Member. Families enjoyed this great tournament paid for by the Anglers, with refreshments and prizes for almost all fish caught.

One of the Anglers' most important activities was to lend a hand for the clean-up and rebuilding of the Historic Fishing Franks Tackle shop. The fishing store was burnt down by a horrible truck accident in the middle of the night. Many of the Anglers gave time to this project and President, Tom Zalac, led the Anglers in raising contributions to help keep the many talented employees available for work. Fishing Franks is now in a new location, and again helping new and experienced anglers to enjoy our sport. Most recently, the Burnt Store Anglers participated in collecting fishing tackle for kids, who under faculty direction, started the Punta Gorda Middle School Fishing Club. The Anglers turned over 25 fishing outfits and tons of fishing tackle for use by the kids. In the club's effort to respect conservation of Charlotte Harbor, The Anglers have made annual contributions from its members to Captains for Clean Water, a new organization, working tirelessly to keep our waters clean and healthy. It has always been the Anglers hope that fishing would be the method by which all 165 of its members could find activities to help our community.

During January 2009, Jay Lev, then Tournament Chairman of the Anglers, was contacted by a television production group to see if the Burnt Store Anglers would be interested in cosponsoring and providing facilities for the first ever Guy Harvey Ultimate Shark Challenge to run in 2010. The shark no-kill fishing tournament would be hosted by the world-famous artist and conservationist Guy Harvey. The purpose of the event would be to develop a televised Catch and Release Shark Tournament here in Charlotte Harbor to highlight the importance of protecting the local shark species and conducting research on this fishery. This huge event would bring anglers to Burnt Store Marina from all over the world, and have television crews from two networks. The New York Times also decided to have reporters on our boats, as well as several NBC news anchors. Needless to say, the Burnt Store Anglers were in shock that we were selected for this incredible event. Captain Robert Moore, a longtime friend of the anglers, helped the Anglers with discussions to bring the event to Burnt Store Marina. The marina owners graciously gave the Anglers use of the marina facilities, and the Burnt Store Golf and Activity Club Board of Directors contributed use of the club house facility as Tournament Headquarters. The facility also served as a TV Studio, Mote Marine Shark Research Program training center and the award Banquet. Just about every member of the Anglers volunteered to help bring off this immense event. Phil Giaramita, a longtime member of the anglers, loaned his beautiful offshore boat to serve as the communication vessel for the tournament. His crew included Marv Bergman, past president

of the Anglers, and Bob Corwin, a charter member. Phil, with the help of Captain Rob Moore, would call the tournament on or off due to weather, and would forward all communications about shark catches to the base communication center, located on the dock of the marina. Eighteen members of the Burnt Store Anglers would also be trained as official tournament observers and be onboard tournament boats to verify and identification catches. The 18 members of the Anglers selected for the observer program would be trained by world famous shark researcher, Dr. Bob Hueter of Mote Marine Shark Research Center. Tournament Volunteer Coordinator, Jay Lev and his crew of over 40 volunteers from the Anglers were exhausted but happy that the tournament was an overwhelming success.

Unfortunately, Guy Harvey on his way to Burnt Store Marina for the tournament, was called back to the Bahamas due to the passing of his father. Dr. Harvey asked if we would help with the second tournament to be housed at Lashley Park due to the expected 5000 visitors to the tournament. The Burnt Store Anglers were delighted to help. Guy Harvey, Wendy Benchley, wife of Peter Benchley, author of the book and movie director "Jaws" would be present. Mrs. Benchley made arrangements for the complete exhibit of the Jaws movie to be shipped to the tournament grounds to be on hand for all to enjoy. This tournament went as well as the first. Jay Lev and volunteer representative Jon Oemig were called to the awards stage by Guy Harvey to represent the Burnt Store Anglers and was presented with an original print signed by Guy Harvey with a note saying, "A special Thanks to all the Burnt Store Anglers for their outstanding volunteer help", signed Guy Harvey.

Among the many charity and scientific activities of the Burnt Store Anglers, volunteers like Maryellen Black, our first Fisher Person of the year, Bill and Elaine Kimber, longtime members and Treasurer (Elaine was also our two-time Angler of the year), made things run smoothly.

A very special "Thank You" to our past and current presidents for many hours of volunteer efforts on behalf of the Burnt Store Anglers, and our Burnt Store Community: Jay Lev, Ron Doig, Ed Kosiewicz, Ted Morand, Jon Oemig, Marv Bergman, Dave Roop, and Tom Zalac. The entire fishing club offers a "Job Well Done" to our volunteer Past Presidents.

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Guardian ad Litem (GAL) Volunteers and Foundation

Southwest Florida currently has over 2140 children in the dependency court system, with over 200 children in foster homes in Charlotte County alone. These children, through no fault of their own, have been placed under court supervision, and removed from their homes because of abuse, neglect or abandonment.

Over 125 of your Charlotte County neighbors, including a number of Burnt Store Marina residents, and over 500 Southwest Florida residents, are currently serving as Guardian ad Litem (GAL) volunteer advocates. In 2021, the Guardian ad Litem program represented over 1200 kids. The goal is 100% representation, so there is more work to be done, and more volunteers to be recruited, trained and supported.

Each case typically takes from one to three years to be resolved. These vulnerable children, many of whom live in temporary homes until a safe, permanent solution is achieved, experience many changes, often very rapidly. Their futures are very uncertain, and their young fragile lives are extremely stressful because they do not know what will happen next. During this very uncertain time, dedicated trained GAL volunteers become the "voice" for these children in the courts, and their temporary living placements, schools, the case management system, and with other community agencies. At all times, GAL volunteers are working under the mission of "I am for the child." In many cases, the GAL volunteer is the one constant in the child's life.

During this critical time GAL volunteers determine if

the child's needs are being met. The volunteers can submit requests on the child's behalf to the GAL Foundation to help stabilize the children, by providing a sense of normalcy with items such as beds, tutoring, clothing, strollers, sports participation, field trips, happier birthdays, and many other things not funded by any other source through the Foundation's *Children's Needs Program*. All these children want is to find their forever home, and feel like everyone else their age. They want to feel normal, just like their peers.

The Guardian ad Litem (GAL) Foundation, 20th Judicial Circuit, Inc., raises the funds necessary to meet these needs, and to recruit and train GAL volunteer advocates. On March 19 the second annual Charlotte County signature fundraiser, *Jazz on the Harbor*, will be held at the Port Charlotte Beach Complex. The \$75 ticket includes an elegant buffet dinner, music by the Isaac Mingus Trio and a glorious sunset. Last year this fun evening raised over \$15,000. This year's event promises to be even bigger! Your attendance or sponsorship for the upcoming Charlotte County Jazz on the Harbor event will help achieve the goal of matching EVERY child in the Charlotte County court dependency system with a volunteer Guardian ad Litem.

Girl Scout Cookie Season Is Here!

Five years after Juliette Gordon Low founded the Girl Scouts in 1912, young girls (with the help of their mothers) began baking cookies at home and selling them to support their troop activities.

In July of 1922, a magazine titled *The American Girl*, published by the Girl Scouts, printed a recipe for a shortbread cookie with the suggestion that these be sold for fundraisers. It was estimated that the cost of the ingredients was 26 to 36 cents for six or seven dozen. Throughout the coming years Girl Scouts made simple sugar cookies at home, packaged them in wax paper with a sticker, and sold them door-to-door for 25 to 35 cents per dozen.

Girl Scouts sell cookies each year as a fundraiser to support camping trips, STEM projects and entrepreneurial pursuits among other activities. Selling season is January through April. Cookies will be sold at booths from Feb. 4 to March 6.

To find where cookies will be sold in your area download the **Girl Scout Cookie Finder** app from the App Store or go to **www.girlscouts.org**, click on **Cookies**, then click **Buy Girl Scout Cookies**. For 2022 a new cookie called AdventurefulsTM is being showcased. These are "brownie-inspired cookies topped with caramel flavored crème with a hint of sea salt." 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Passwords That Hackers Will Guess First

Avoid these common, easy-to-crack passwords ... unless you want to end up as the victim of a hacker.

When it comes to creating a password, many of us focus on devising a combination of letters, numbers, and symbols that we will always be able to remember. According to technology expert Burton Kelso, it is human nature to fall into a predictable routine of creating passwords. "We tend to create passwords based on things familiar to us, such as common words, names, and locations," he explains. "Then we try to make things complicated for a hacker by adding a capital letter, a number, or a special character." However, unless we come up with unpredictable passwords, we are giving hackers an easy way to break into our accounts.

But, as they say, knowledge is power. So to stay safe online on your phone or other devices, you need to know a few secrets that hackers don't want you to know – including the fact that they'll first try these common methods and passwords in order to get their hands on your personal information.

They Start Off With A Password List

Kelso explains that there are several websites that offer "popular password" lists. While the intention is to encourage people to shy away from the most frequently used passwords, they are a great starting point for hackers. Mark Burnett, a security consultant and researcher, recently published 10 million passwords on his website Xato to provide a better understanding of how people formulate passwords. However, it also gives hackers a good place to start.

They Will Create Bots

If they have gone through all their resources, hackers have one final tool to break your code: they can create a "bot" that will try every possible



combination. (A "bot" – short for robot – is a software program that performs automated, repetitive, predefined tasks.) "Keep in mind, modern computers can make password guesses from 10,000 to over a billion guesses per second," Kelso explains.

Sequential Number Combinations

The trend of using number combinations has continued, according to a list of the top 200 hundred most common passwords of 2020 released by NordPass. Many of the top 10 passwords – a whopping seven – included simple number combinations of 1 through 10, with seven of the top 10 being number combinations.

"Owerty"

NordPass also revealed that "qwerty" is the most popular letter combo for passwords. "Qwerty" and "qwertyuiop" also made the top 20. (Qwerty: sequential computer keyboard letters.) Other variations, including numbers inbetween each letter, remained on the top of the leaderboard throughout the list of 200. While it might seem random

to you, running your fingers along the top line of your keyboard is totally predictable to a hacker.

"Password"

Whatever you do, avoid using the word "password" as your password. While the word itself is one of the worst you can choose, many other configurations of the word with letters and numbers are also on hackers' go-to lists.

So, What Are The Best Passwords, Anyway?

To break the cycle of creating weak, easy-to-guess passwords, Kelso maintains that the best type of password to keep hackers out of your stuff is a passphrase. "A passphrase is two or more words put together that form a password," he explains. Some examples of passphrases are "stinkychicken" or "spangledbloatedowl." You can also opt to have your computer generate random passphrases and store them on your computer – in a secure spot, of course.



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Southwest Florida Area Meetings Offer A Solution To Food Addiction

Many people resort to desperate measures to control their weight and the way they eat – expensive diets, surgery, medications, excessive exercise, purging, abuse of laxatives, and extreme food restriction. Others don't know where to turn or have just given up hope. There is, however, an effective long-term solution that thousands have found through Food Addicts in Recovery Anonymous, or FA. As one member puts it, "I've kept 65 pounds off my body for almost 12 years – I couldn't keep it off for 12 minutes before FA. I would go on a diet, hit my goal weight, and immediately go out and celebrate with food. After that, I'd start putting it all back on and then some"

Based on the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, FA understands food addiction as a physical craving and an ever-increasing dependence upon and struggle with food, particularly flour, sugar, and quantities. FA is distinctive because it focuses on long-term recovery from addiction.

Founded in 1998, there are now more than 608 FA meetings across the United States and worldwide – including 11 in the Southwest Florida area. Meetings are open to all those who are interested in learning about the program for themselves or for others whom they think might find FA helpful.

FA has no dues, fees, or purchase of special foods and is not affiliated with any public or private organization, ideology, or religious doctrine. It is a fellowship of women and men – diverse in age, ethnicity, and socio-economic

background – who, through shared experience and mutual support, are recovering from food addiction.

Some members come to FA because of weight-related physical problems. As one man explains, "I was morbidly obese at 341 pounds and had a laundry list of health problems: knee and back problems, heart palpitations, acid reflux, high blood pressure, high cholesterol ... I also suffered from anxiety and depression. Since coming to FA, I now weigh 165 pounds and have maintained this weight for more than five years. I do not suffer from any of those physical (or mental) ailments any longer." Many members report going off or greatly reducing their medications for Type 2 diabetes.

Other members come to FA for relief from the self-loathing and unhappiness that accompanied their struggle with food. As Carly describes it, "'I'll just have one,' always lead me to having 'just one' until the plate, box or bag was empty. I hated myself for not being able to control my eating. I thought about food and my weight 24/7." And another member says, "I used food to comfort me, to push down unwanted feelings, as a buffer between me and life. It wasn't working. Following the FA program and working the Twelve Steps has allowed me to become the person I always wanted to be, both physically and emotionally."

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






Golf Tips

Sharing Banking Passwords And Usernames

A local bank manager reached out to one of our Lee County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention Practitioners, just prior to the start of the new year, and shared a concern that I believe needs to be readdressed.

While the topic of password security is not new, and while many have tired of warnings regarding identity theft and fraud, this particular bank manager recognized a significant increase in this fraudulent activity and losses by bank consumers.

Victims are receiving calls, emails and/or texts from what they believe to be their bank or lending institution. The caller indicates that the victim's account has potentially been hacked or accessed and asks the victim to provide usernames and passwords for their accounts. Emails and text messages often contain bank logos and appear to be official and legitimate.

As is often the case, seniors continue to be most frequently targeted and victimized.

At this time, the Lee County Sheriff's Office wants to remind you that:

- 1. A bank or financial institution will not ask you for your username and/or password over the phone, via email or via text ... never!
- 2. If you get a phone call asking for personal information hang up. Do not, under any circumstances, provide personal or financial information to the caller.
- 3. Do not click on **any** links in an email or text regarding your accounts.
- 4. Call your bank or financial institution to verify the security of your account and let them know of the attempt to get usernames and/or passwords from you.
- 5. Change your username and password regularly and consider using stronger passwords. Avoid using passwords that can easily be guessed ... such as 123456, the word "password," your name, your house number, your dog's name, etc. While a bit more tedious to type and remember, use at least eight characters and consider including uppercase letters, numerals and symbols such as &, !, @.
- 6. Guard your usernames, passwords and other personal information such as Social Security numbers. Don't carry them in your wallet or store them near your computer ... where others can see them.
- 7. Repeatedly remind seniors of these criminal activities and ask that they call you, **prior** to sharing information, when uncertain or unsure.

Remember, your financial security is at stake. Lifetime savings can be eliminated in a moment. Exercise extreme caution when your personal information is involved.

Wildlife Caution Notice

Owners are asked to use caution and be aware of local wildlife such as coyotes, bobcats, and alligators.

Coyotes sightings have increased as it is their mating season, and they are more aggressive and vocal right now. Recently a Burnt Store Lakes resident witnessed a coyote chase a rabbit into their rain gutter downspout and then pull the downspout into the yard trying to get the rabbit out.

Please watch your pets carefully and keep them on a leash when outside, particularly at dusk, nighttime, and dawn. Smaller pets are especially at risk. Letting them out in a fenced area may not deter a coyote. Make sure pet food, fruit, or other items are stored inside or in tightly shut garbage cans. Ensure your home is not luring small rodents or animals that coyotes like to prey on.

One of the best attributes of living in Burnt Store Marina & The Lakes is the abundant wildlife. However, residents need to be aware of our wildlife and be cautious to ensure their own safety and the safety of their pets.

Giving Back to the Community: — The Burnt Store - PPYC Charitable Boating Foundation

The Covid-19 disruptions have had wide-ranging implications for all of us as individuals, but have also impacted, in a significant way, the operations of many charitable organizations operating in our communities. The Burnt Store - PPYC Charitable Boating Foundation, founded in 2015, has as its mission, providing educational opportunities relating to boating and related marine topics to the community, as well as other charitable activities from time to time, as approved by the Board of Directors. What then are those activities and how were they impacted over the last 24 months?

One of the Foundation's traditional partners has been the Boys and Girls Club of Charlotte County ("BGCCC") who support young children through its programs and facilities. Over the period 2015 through 2019 the Foundation arranged a highly successful "Kids on the Water" event which saw several hundred children gain access to the waters of Charlotte Harbor, primarily on boats owned by members of Platinum Point Yacht Club. Despite living in the midst of our marine wonderland, this was often their first opportunity to get out on the harbor. The event also included a boating safety presentation, co-hosted with the U.S. Coast Guard. In 2020 this program had to be canceled due to Covid-19, so the Foundation pivoted and instead supported, with funds and manpower, a Weekend Meal Program for 10 families in need, identified by BGCCC management. In 2021 the Foundation was able to introduce a modified approach to again allow the BGCCC youth to gain access to the water.

The Foundation chartered a large Kingfisher Fleet cruise boat to take the young people up to the rookeries in the Peace River in a safe, socially distanced format. They had a fabulous time.



Other programs supported by the Foundation have been annual bursaries to allow deserving children to attend the Learn to Sail programs at Gulf Shore Sailing School in Punta Gorda, and cash donations to the marine biology program at Charlotte High School. Other organizations we have partnered with include Crossroads Hope Academy, Make It Count Sports, the U.S. Coast Guard, and a new initiative with an organization supporting adults with cognitive challenges.

These programs have been funded from a variety of sources including tax deductible donations from community members, and the proceeds from the sale of "Where Do We Live?" the book about the history and geography of Burnt Store Road which was donated to the Foundation in 2015.

The Foundation is governed by an eight person Board of Directors, which meets four times a year, to plan future events and initiatives. The organization is a Public Charity under IRS Section 501(c)3, and has a Florida Solicitation of Funds registration number CH45066.




