We knew we were in trouble when Jim Cantore, of the Weather Channel, began in St Pete, but turned up in Punta Gorda within hours. Nobody likes to see Jim show up in their community, nobody!

We all know the cleanup process will take more time than we want it to. We also know that we were extremely blessed in that we did not receive the water surge that was predicted for our area, anywhere from 8 to 20 feet. Others in our area did get the water surge, and we have all seen the pictures of the devastation that the storm brought to them. We had the winds, lots of full trees down, lanai cages and stairwells down, water damage to some units, but no injuries or loss of life for us.

The best thing that happened was that those who were here, and those that returned within a few days, got out and began cleaning up our properties. Working like ants, meeting, and working with new neighbors, making sure everyone in the neighborhood was okay, and taking care of water damage that may have occurred. Once again, our residents showed their strength and fortitude to come together, and get things done the best that we could under the circumstances that were given to us.

We are already working on a better plan to deal with future storms that we all hope will never come our way. Without any power or cell phone service for many days, we did lack a central point of contact for communications. We also need to declare a facility as the main headquarters for not only the communications, but to coordinate activities and begin to provide some services to our residents. We will go through a process, with being designated by FEMA as a day facility, to not only receive assistance, but also training. This will give us better local communications within our community, and to those in charge at the county and state level.

We thank those that work here in the Marina who came to work, even though their own homes and neighborhoods were damaged. Our thanks includes workers on our security team, the maintenance workers at the golf course who helped clear trees and branches around the community, and the many resident volunteers who came out to help clear up our common areas and around our facilities, even though they had lost their lanais, had trees on their houses, no elevators, or water damage in their units.

Remember to write legibly and clearly complete the entire form, including having your HOA representative sign off (if required). 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

Community Access Committee

As a reminder to all residents in the community, the following information should be updated at the Main Gate on a regular basis:

- Phone numbers
- Permanent Guests (Additions and Deletions)
- Barcodes for sold vehicles

Season is upon us, and it is time to think about some of the "Rules Of The Road" for our community:

- All motor vehicles are expected to follow Florida State Law to include stopping at all stop signs, maintaining posted speed limits, and driving in designated road ways.
- Drivers of golf carts are reminded that they are required to be 16 years of age and licensed to operate a golf cart within the community. Golf carts are also required to drive in the same direction as traffic, and in the designated road ways with motor vehicles. If your golf cart does not have appropriate turning signals, please utilize proper hand signals to indicate your direction of travel. Golf carts capable of high speeds are also required to follow the posted speed limits within the community.
- Residents and guests to the community riding bicycles should also ride in the direction of flow of traffic within the community. Riders under the age of 16 should be wearing a helmet as directed by Florida State Law.
- Pedestrians, or persons walking within the community, are afforded the same courtesies as they do outside of the community.
- Drivers should yield the right of way to a pedestrian in a properly marked cross walk. Pedestrians should also walk in the opposite direction of traffic so that they can see motor vehicles approaching. This is for your personal safety.

It is important that we do all we can to avoid an unnecessary accident within our community. With everyone's support, we can have an accident free season for all to enjoy.

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Tight Lines... Fisherman beware! - Tough Fishing Environment for the Next Few Months

With all the devastation caused to the harbor by the hurricane, not to mention the homes and environment, our fishing will be much different in the months ahead. Islands we knew as hot fishing spots are now gone, sandbars we



have not seen before are popping out of the water, and the plant growth underwater is almost gone. But, as we did before, we will learn about our new environment as the year goes on.

With over 150 Burnt Store Anglers, we will dedicate information, in each of our monthly columns, reported by the fishermen, as it pertains to navigation, fishing spots and how our fish have adapted.

Just before the hurricane, I had to have some surgery that kept me off the water. I took advantage of my recliner and large screen television to watch fishing shows 24/7. As a result of watching the shows, and each guide's special fishing tackle, I made notes to contact these guides and see where they bought, or made, the special tackle they were using.

Pictured are five pieces of tackle that were repeatedly being used by a great many of successful guides. I would like to recommend these five to you:

First, I tracked down a wonderful tackle shop in Cut Off, Louisiana. The shop is called Four Horseman Tackle. The shop makes a great casting cork combo that has a very durable float, with casting weights built into the design. It casts a mile and makes an incredible fuss in the water. I bought a dozen



in varying colors to take with me on future trips for snook, trout and redfish. The float combo is made by the shop. You can contact them at **www.4Horsementackle.com**. This float combo is a real innovation.

Second, while going through the shop's website, I found a beautifully designed plastic shrimp that the shop calls their BOOM BOOM Shrimp. The shop only offers the shrimp in the two "killer" colors that nails big redfish. Attached with three feet of 20-pound leader material under the cork, it is going to catch a lot of fish. That artificial shrimp bait is also made in the USA right in their Louisiana tackle shop.

Third, pictured is the XRS-UV Jig Heads. To my surprise, I found them available on line in packs of five with a white head that glows under water. They were designed by SmartTackle

of New Orleans, LA. I tried them on several of my soft baits, and they bring the soft bait to life. This is a real winner for your tackle box. They can be reached at **www.Fishsmarttackle.com**. I bought the 1/8 oz. head for most conditions.

Fourth, pictured is a package of Fishbites in the saltwater series. I tried using the scented E-Z Clam strip, EZ Crab in Chartreuse and the EZ Shrimp in Pink. These baits are packaged in resealable packs, are cut in strips, and it takes a good fish bite to get it off the hook. So far, I have caught several nice-sized snook, a ton of seatrout and a nice eight-pound redfish while using these Fishbites. When you can't find white bait or buy live shrimp, this is the bait to have with you.

Last, getting back to our current fishing conditions post hurricane, please be sure to fish with a good pair of fishing gloves. Not only do they protect your hands from the sun, they will protect you from that horrible ameba that likes to infect you should it find its way into a scrape or hook puncture on your hand. AFTCO has many great versions of the fishing glove on line. It is worth the \$20 to wear them on your next trip. It is also important to carry a bottle of clean fresh water along with an antiseptic liquid soap that you can use to quickly wash off with. Inexpensive alcohol packs are also worth carrying with you. Let's hope the water clears up and these awful creatures die off. Be safe.

Rules of the Road


Motor Vehicles: Always drive your vehicle on the right side of the road. There are no "turn lanes" within Burnt Store Marina. Never drive your vehicle in lanes indicated for the use of bicycles and pedestrians. Always stop at stop signs. Never exceed the posted speed limit.

Bicycles: Always ride your bicycle on the right side of the road, even if there is no "bike lane" available. Use hand signals to indicate intention to turn. Always stop at stop signs. Never exceed the posted speed limit.

Golf Carts: Always drive your golf cart on the right side of the road. Use hand signals to indicate intention to turn. Always stop at stop signs. Use lanes indicated for the use of bicycles and pedestrians only when neither is present.

Pedestrians: Always use lanes provided for bicycles and pedestrians. If there is no lane available, use the left side of the street, facing wheeled traffic. Use caution when crossing streets. Wear reflective clothing and carry a flashlight when walking or running after sunset.

Here are some December dates to remember...try not to eat too much:

December 2, 1804: Napoleon Bonaparte was crowned Emperor of France by Pope Pius VII in Paris.

December 7: National Cotton Candy Day

December 11, 1901: The first transatlantic radio signal was transmitted by Guglielmo Marconi from Cornwall, England, to St. John's, Newfoundland.

December 13: National Ice Cream Day

December 15, 1791: The Bill of Rights (first 10 amendments to the U.S. Constitution) became effective following ratification by Virginia.

December 15, 1939: Gone with the Wind had its world premiere in Atlanta, introduced by producer David O. Selznick and featuring appearances by Vivien Leigh and Clark Gable.

December 16: Chocolate Covered Anything Day

December 17: National Maple Syrup Day

December 18 – 26: Hanukkah begins the eight-day Jewish festival, also known as the festival of lights. On each day a Menorah (an eight branched candelabra) is lit with an ascending number of candles to match the day. The reason for Chanukah is based on the story of the Maccabees battle with the Greeks. It is told that one pure bottle of olive oil lasted for eight days in the Holy Temple. It should have lasted only for the first day.

December 19, 1732: Benjamin Franklin first published Poor Richard's Almanac containing weather predictions, humor, proverbs, and epigrams, eventually selling nearly 10,000 copies per year.

December 25: Christmas Day, commemorating the birth of Jesus of Nazareth. Although the exact date of his birth is not known, it has been celebrated on December 25th by the Western (Roman Catholic) Church since 336

December 26 - January 1: Kwanzaa, an African American family observance established in 1966 celebrating traditional African harvest festivals, focusing on family unity, with a community harvest feast on the seventh day. Kwanzaa means "first fruit" in Swahili.

December 30: Bicarbonate of Soda Day

December 31: New Year's Eve, the final evening of the year, traditionally a night for merry-making to welcome in the new year.

Rules for Driving Golf Carts

There has been some confusion about operating golf carts in Burnt Store Marina. Please be aware that there are rules for golf cart use, and violation will get you (a citation from the Lee (County Sheriff's Office.



- Drivers of golf carts must observe the same rules as those designated for drivers of motor vehicles. Drivers must keep their carts on the right side of all streets, and obey all traffic signage.
- No one under 14 is allowed to drive a golf cart within the Burnt Store Marina premises.
- No one not playing golf is allowed to drive a golf cart on the golf course.

I walked through the marina three days after the storm and was shocked by the sight of boats swept from the racks and others jumbled together among the damaged docks. My heartfelt sympathy goes out to those boaters. GMS



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Know Your Plant Hardiness Zones


If you came to live in Burnt Store Marina from points north, like most of us did, you probably think that if it's called a "tropical plant," you can plant it in your yard, or put it on your porch. If you *Google* "tropical plant," you will most likely come up with gobs of photos of houseplants that, up north, can only grow inside where air is temperature and controlled.

Now, after *Hurricane Ian*, many of us need to replace some or all of our landscaping. When you select a plant for your yard, you need to keep several factors in mind. You can't plant a shade lover in the sun, or a sun lover in the shade. You need to be aware of how much water the plant needs and can tolerate. And, you need to know how much heat or cold that it can bear and to thrive in.

This takes us to Plant Hardiness Zones. The USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) has created numbered zones to guide gardeners and growers how to determine which plants are most likely to thrive at a location. The Plant Hardiness Zones map divisions are based on the average annual minimum winter temperature, and is divided into zones for each 10-degree Fahrenheit difference. There are 13 zones from Alaska in the north to Puerto Rico in the south. Florida has 4 zones (8,9,10 and 11), which have been divided again by a 5-degree difference into "a" and "b."

And yes, our hardiness zones 8, 9, and 10 are considered the best for gardening due to several factors. First, these zones have a long growing season of at least 9 months from March to November. And second, winter low temperatures tend to be the mildest.

So, when researching the plants you may want in your landscaping, be sure to check for their hardiness zone number. And remember that plants that may thrive in zone 5 may not do well in our designated zones - 9b and 10a.






Outer Banks Crab Cakes

- 1 lb. flaked crab meat
- 3/4 cup cracker crumbs
- 1 large egg, slightly beaten
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 ½ teaspoons Crystal hot sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon fresh ground pepper

Mix all above ingredients in medium bowl with a fork. Form a 3-inch patty and roll in extra cracker crumbs.

Heat oil in skillet or deep fryer to 375 degrees. Fry until golden brown (about 3 minutes on each side) and drain on paper towel. Serve immediately.

Enjoy with a light dry white wine.

One morning a fellow walker stopped me and asked what the distance was around Prosperity Point, and how far was it from there to the front entry gate. With lots of residents returning and enjoying our pedestrian paths, I offer the following. All distances were measured with a GPS while riding in a golf cart.

• Islamorada Entrance Gate to Cape Cole Blvd. – 0.82

- Cape Cole Blvd., golf clubhouse gate arm to Islamorada Blvd. – 0.60 mile
- Cape Cole Blvd., golf club gate arm to Matecumbe Key entry -0.72 mile
- Matecumbe Key Blvd., construction entrance to Cape Cole Blvd., 0.72 mile
- Matecumbe Key Blvd., Cape Cole Blvd., to South Shore -0.55 mile
 - Courtside Landings' Loop, start/stop at entrance 0.48 mile
- Prosperity Point sidewalk loop, start/stop at Matcumbe Key Blvd, 1.26 mile
- Admiral's Point loop (includes Key Largo Lane Circle, Sable Key Circle and Key Largo Circle) start/ stop at Marathon & Cape Cole Blvd., 1.06 mile

Major Florida Hurricanes Affecting Southwest Florida – 1848-2017

In an earlier article (BSM Beacon, August 2015 and, also in the Hurricane Amnesia chapter of my book Where Do We Live?) the tracks of the 17 Category 1 to 5 hurricanes that passed within 60 miles of Burnt Store Marina were illustrated on a map of the area. Below is a sad reminder of the devastation wreaked by a few of these storms.

1848 – Several trading posts in Charlotte Harbor, including the future Burnt Store, were destroyed or badly damaged, and both Stump Pass in Englewood and New Pass in Sarasota were created.

1873 – Punta Rassa, at the mouth of the Caloosahatchee, was destroyed by a 14-foot storm surge, which also flooded Sanibel with 5 feet of salt water.

1910 - Seven Cuban fishermen were killed when their schooners were sunk off Punta Gorda, and a school was blown off its foundations. Fort Myers Beach was swallowed, and much of the water was blown out of Tampa Bay.

1921 – The Tampa Bay Hurricane produced a tide 7 feet above normal at Punta Gorda and a 12-foot storm surge in Tampa Bay, which flooded the city.

1926 - The Great Miami Hurricane hit Charlotte Harbor after crossing the state. Punta Gorda City Dock was destroyed, and Redfish Pass was created splitting Captiva and North Captiva Islands. The almost completed first Matlacha Bridge was toppled into the channel when a barge hit it.

1928 - The Great Okeechobee Hurricane killed over 1,800 in West Palm, and the area south of Okeechobe, and caused much flooding along the west coast. The 1926 and 1928 storms were featured in the final chapters of the novel A Land Remembered.

1935 – The Labor Day Hurricane damaged much of the Florida Keys and maintained category 4 status when it struck Charlotte Harbor, causing extensive flooding.

1941-1947 - Charlotte Harbor was struck by six different tropical storms or hurricanes causing much damage. In 1944 a storm surge covered Gasparilla Island. On September 18, 1947, 8.7 inches of rain were reported at Fort Myers.

1960 - Hurricane Donna (in 1950 hurricanes began receiving names) travelled just inland of Charlotte Harbor and had winds of 130 mph (as measured by FPL). Water was first pulled out of Charlotte Harbor then brought back in causing an 8-foot storm surge, which flooded Punta Gorda. The steeple of the Punta Gorda Presbyterian Church was toppled.

2004 – Hurricane Charley – I am a sailor, so the account of Charley that has made the greatest impression on me was the story told by Capt. Kevin Hughes of his efforts to evade and then survive Charley on his 37-foot sailboat s/v Windigo III in Charlotte Harbor. (Sailing in a Hurricane, Parts 1 & 2 were published by Southwinds Magazine in November and December 2004). The Sun Newspapers of Port Charlotte published a pictorial book in 2004 titled Direct Hit Images of Hurricane Charley (now difficult to find, but Charlotte County Libraries have copies) and the Cape Coral Daily Breeze published a similar book titled *Eye of the Hurricane*:

2017 - Hurricane Irma

Nature's Fury 2004.

- Thanks to a last minute "wobble" as she came ashore at Marco Island, and an earlier decay of the trailing eye-wall as she brushed Cuba, Irma did relatively little damage to homes along the Burnt Store coast. Water was drawn out of several harbors and the sea wall collapsed in many spots in Burnt Store Marina and in the canals of Cape Coral and Punta Gorda.

More details of these and many other tropical storms are well documented and illustrated in a very readable book by Jay Barnes titled Florida's Hurricane History, which is available at the Lee County Library.

The practice green area is a great place to start when trying to get your game back into mid-season form. When practicing around the green, there are a couple of basics to remember. The first one is to make sure you have most of your weight on your front side, play the ball slightly back of center in your stance, and be aggressive through the ball. When you are on the green practicing your putting stroke, play the ball just in front of the center of your stance, keep your head still, and listen to the ball dropping in the cup. If you start with your short game, the long game will follow.

Gardener's Wheelbarrow

By Maggie Hart, Mariners Pass At last! Everyone can move outside and enjoy their garden. Cooler days and nights have finally arrived. The month of December will generally be dry, with only two inches of rain.

By now, you have had the time to appraise your landscaping after Hurricane Ian, and begin planning for replacements and new additions. Pay attention to what trees and shrubs that were destroyed by the storm, and both their pre-storm condition and location in your landscape. This is a good indication of what to plant and where to plant it...this is much like starting over. Because of December dryness and possible frost, it is not the time of the year to be planting your new additions. Wait for spring.

Plan to remove a tree if the main trunk is cracked or broken, or if the major roots have been damaged. Many trees and palms can be straightened up and braced until healthier. For palms, keep all green fronds, even if broken or twisted. The fronds provide assistance for regrowth. Plan on watering and fertilizing them to bring them back

If there are any blooming trees still standing, this month's bloomers include fall orchid trees, kapok trees and white shaving brush trees. Most flowering tropical plants will continue to bloom, unless challenged by frosty temperatures.

This month's garden checklist:

- Tropical plants this is not their favorite season. You will probably see some yellowing and loss of foliage due to cooler temperatures. Chill plus any rain can cause brown spots to appear on the leaves of ixora and croton.
 - Frost predicted? Cover your plants (no plastic!), and

remember to remove the covering by 10 a.m. so daytime temperatures don't cook your plants. And, to be on the safe side, orchids should be brought in or protected if temperatures are predicted to drop below 50 degrees.

- Potted poinsettias need to be watered, but should not be allowed to get too wet. They do best with at least 14 hours of natural or artificial light per day.
- · Christmas cacti and kalanchoes are best watered every two to three weeks. Once they bloom, they require lots of light, but very little water – and no fertilizer.
- Cages, pools, proximity to a wall, a rotating ceiling fan...all will moderate temperatures. The coldest temperature will occur around 6 - 6:30 a.m. It only

takes a few minutes of cold, not freezing temperatures, to substantially harm or kill tropical plants.

- · You probably don't need to prune much after the beating most plants took from the storm – but don't be tempted! Pruning encourages tender new growth that can be killed by frost. You can safely prune again in March.
- Annuals remove dead flowers to encourage continued flowering.
- At this time of year, established plants have definitely slowed down their growth rate and consequently require less of everything...water, fertilizer and pruning. Water less frequently, but deeply, to encourage deep healthy

Grammar Tips...Apostrophes

In English writing, apostrophes are used in two ways – either in contractions or in possessives. But what's the difference?

A contraction is a shortened form of a word (or group of words) that omits certain letters or sounds. In a contraction, an apostrophe represents missing letters. Examples are: isn't (is not), can't (cannot), they're (they are) and it's (it is).

Possessives are used to describe belonging. They describe a noun that belongs to another noun. Examples

are: Santa's reindeer, Debbie's cats and the bird's song. With pronouns, there are no apostrophes: his reindeer, her cat and its song.

One of the common errors with apostrophes involves "its" and "it's." With these errors, many people confuse the rules of apostrophe use. They add an apostrophe to "it" as they would with nouns, like Santa, Debbie and bird. As a result, they may end up with "it's song." This really means, "it is song," when that is not the intended meaning. If you are uncertain whether you are using "its" or "it's" correctly, stop and ask yourself, "do I want to say 'its' (possessive) or 'it is' (verb)?"

The rules about forming possessive nouns probably cause the most apostrophe confusion. For most nouns, to make possessive, add an apostrophe (+) "s." If the noun is <u>plural</u>, ending in "s," add only an apostrophe at the end of the word.


And here's another grammar rule for you: adding an "s" to the end of a noun makes it plural. This includes numbers, letters and dates, for example, "8s," "Ds" and "1990s." **Never** use an apostrophe to make them plural. If you do, you are making them possessive.





The Big Red Bus from **ONEBLOOD** will be coming to Burnt Store Marina Monday, January 16 from 8:30 a.m. – 3 p.m. We look forward to seeing our veteran donors, and meeting many new Burnt Store area residents. There will be incentive gifts for all donors.

Generally healthy people age 16 or older, and who weigh at least 110 pounds can donate blood. A photo ID is required. To learn more about the importance of blood donation, and how donors can target the power of their blood type, visit **oneblood.org.** All donors receive a wellness checkup of blood pressure, pulse, temperature, iron count, a cholesterol

screening, plus a surprise gift. One of three people will need blood in their lifetime. Blood that is donated on this day will likely be transfused within two to three days. The turnaround is that fast, the need is constant. Blood is made up of four main components: red blood cells, platelets, plasma, and white blood cells. Each whole blood donation has the potential to save up to three lives.

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
